**A Letter From The Pope.**

LONDON, April 9.—The Chronicle will to-morrow publish a despatch from Rome which gives an important letter that Cardinal Rampolla has addressed to the editor of that paper, under date of April 9. The translation of the letter is as follows:

"Sir—Among the most precious gifts the Divine Redeemer bestowed upon the world was that of peace, and no better desire can exist than that peace should reign upon the earth. Justly, therefore, the pope, a vicar eternal of the prince of peace, desires to co-operate in every effort towards the maintenance of the concord and union of hearts among the nations.

"On this account, his holiness, being informed by me of the earnestness with which you are promoting the institution of a permanent tribunal for the purpose of deciding internal controversies and safeguarding the people from the perils of war, cannot but show his satisfaction and express the wish that God will happily crown these praiseworthy efforts with success."

LONDON, April 10.—A despatch to the Daily News from Rome says that the pope has congratulated Cardinals Gibbons, Vaughan and Logue for having signed the appeal for Anglo-American arbitration and offers them encouragement to persevere in their noble aim.



**The Nile Expedition.**

WADY HALFA, April 11.—The presence of Osman Digna in the Suakin district while the Khalifa is centralising all his available forces on the Nile to oppose the Egyptian advance is thus explained: Osman Digna is responsible to the Khalifa for the security of the Suakin district. He first heard the news of the proposed Egyptian expedition up the Nile while he was assisting at the siege of Cassala by the Dervishes. He hurried immediately to the neighborhood of Suakin, supposing that the expedition against Dongola would start from there, as expeditions have done with a similar purpose before. He has been in the neighborhood ever since and has had a number of flying encounters with the natives.

**No More Boxing**

BOSTON, April 12.—In the house of representatives to-day the second consideration of the bill prohibiting all boxing contests developed a sharp debate and the bill passed 149 to 41. The bill aims to prohibit public exhibitions for purses as well as the scientific meetings of clubs, and is the most stringent measure against this form of athletics ever proposed in the state.

Representative Keliher made an urgent appeal for boxing in public and private and contended that the passage of such a bill would tend to drive the sport under cover with disastrous results. He submitted an amendment to permit matches where a trophy not to exceed \$25 in value was offered, which with Mr. Kretz's motion to exempt eight ounce gloves was rejected.

Representative Mellen of Worcester referred to the bill as a bit of "maudlin sentimentality."
