THE GREATEST CHINAMEN.

Li Hu Chang, the Bismarck of China is coming to America. This man is by common consent of those who know a giant of his time, the foremost figure among eight hundred millions of the heathen world. He rose from the ranks, by his own abilities till his greatness overshadowed the imperial throne. His wisdom led him to oppose the war with Japan, and when, unwillingly compelled to lead in the ill-starred conflict and meet with disastrous defeat, he was hurled down to an official degradation which civilized people have no adjective to express. But he is rising again by his own inherent greatness. His emperor was compelled to recall him to negotiate the peace which followed China's humiliation, and in that trying ordeal he justified, as a diplomat, the judgment of General Grant who had declared him to be one of the greatest men in the world. He saved his country and in part regained the favor of his sovereign. Now he goes forth around the world to see and learn for himself those secrets of civilization and progress which Japan had earlier adopted and applied with such tremendous results. When the great man returns to the Central Flowery Kingdom, reinforced by the knowledge he will gain by visiting the west, it is quite possible that a reconstruction of the world's oldest empire may result, affecting in China a change as marvellous as that which has come over Japan. A calm, self-centred man is Li Hung Chang, who has wielded almost autocratic power without elation and suffered a fall into the depths without depression of spirit or loss of personal dignity. So he comes to America, the greatest of Chinamen, to study Christianity in the light of the maxims of Confucius, and to learn all those lessons which the newest and most progressive of the continents can impart to the hoary, moss-grown East. His coming is a significant event.

WHAT HAVE THE OPPOSITION DONE?

What have the Opposition to the Dominion Government done that they should secure public approval?

1. They opposed the purchase of the Northwest Territories for \$1,500,000.
2. They opposed the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway.
3. They opposed the construction of the Grand Trunk Railway, by opposing the public aid given to that enterprise.
4. They left our market open, while in power, to the American farmers, while their markets were closed to us.
5. They advocated in opposition a Commercial Union with the United States.
6. They were ready and anxious to discriminate against Great Britain.
7. They increased our taxes while in power three millions a year.
8. They taxed tea and coffee that every man uses.
9. They increased our debt \$40,000,000 and left nothing to show for it but a history of deficits.
10. They increased the superannuation expenditure four times as fast as have the Conservatives.
11. While preaching purity they have practised the most open faced corruption.
12. They have changed their trade policy almost every year to try and get into power and have thus shown themselves to be demagogues.

The above it seems to us are twelve good reasons why these gentlemen should be kept out of power.

The intelligent electors of Kent have not by any means forgotten the way Oliver J. LeBlanc treated them in resigning his seat in the New Brunswick executive and thereby depriving them of a representative in the provincial cabinet. It would seem that in taking that action Mr. LeBlanc was after the sessional indemnity allowed by the Federal government. We predict that the majority recorded against him in the approaching election will be sufficient to restrain him from entering the political arena for all time to come.

At a largely attended political meeting held at St. Ignace, Saturday evening, Mr. LeBlanc announced himself as a straight Lib.-Con. candidate. Dr. Landry who spoke in favor of Mr. LeBlanc was completely squelched by Mr. McInerney. Some foolish statements made by the good doctor have had the effect of increasing Mr. McInerney's popularity in that district.

Dr. Landry wants to know why, if Mr. McInerney is a friend of the Acadians, he did not have a French revising barrister appointed. The doctor must surely know there is not an Acadian barrister in Kent.

To the Electors of the County of Kent: GENTLEMEN,—Parliament being dissolved, the people are again asked to choose representatives to see after their interests at Ottawa: the day appointed for said choice will be on the 23rd day of June, next.

Having been chosen as candidate at a convention held at Buctouche, in March, 1895, I then accepted the candidature, I have since so often been requested by a large number of electors to be their standard-bearer, that I felt it my duty to offer them an opportunity of ratifying, by their votes on polling day, the choice made of me at that convention.

One of the conditions imposed upon the successful candidate, was his independence of either political party, and in consequence of that, I to-day present myself to the electors of this county as an independent candidate.

If I have the honor of being elected as your representative at Ottawa, I will endeavor by all constitutional means to aid in bringing a satisfactory settlement of the "Manitoba School Question."

I will do all that lies in my power to favor, assist and encourage the agricultural class—the fundamental life of the present and future of this beautiful and fertile Canada of ours.

I pledge myself to support all measures tending to prevent the emigration of our people to the United States and to induce those who are already gone to return—sooner than to spend millions in foreign immigration.

To facilitate the lumbering industry I will try to obtain harbor amelioration without neglecting the wharves and breakwaters.

I will watch, with great solicitude, the fisherman's interests and have a certain system of licenses abolished as I believe it to be unjust and despotic.

Local measures for the County.

I favor: The construction of light houses and necessary reparation to our public wharves.

The continuation of the M. & B. railway, North so as to "bring about the realization of a project familiar to the electors of this County, viz: "The ferry between Richibucto Cape and P. E. I."

The combined construction of a "Post-office and Custom House" at Richibucto.

Gentlemen, in conclusion I have my past experience and political career to offer you as a safe-guard for the above pledges. With the help of my constituents, I hope to fulfill satisfactorily the aforesaid promises advantageous both to you and me.

I therefore, most respectfully ask the hearty support of all the electors who will judge me worthy of their confidence. In return, I will strenuously endeavor to obtain equal justice for all creeds and nationalities, in order to preserve the union and good will in this county, inhabited by a mixed but loyal population.

I will attempt, at public meetings to discuss the political issues of the day, and endeavor to see as many of you, personally, as possible.
