## THE WIDE, WIDE WORLD

VANCOUVER, B. C. World: Thomas Emory, an old pioneer, well known to all the old-timers of 1859, and after whom Emory's bar, the famous placer gold fields on the Fraser river was named, went up the line on Sunday on the way to the home of his youth in New Brunswick which he left in 1847 for California. He had not been in Vancouver before, nor had he seen Victoria or New Westminster since 1870, since which period he has been travelling and prospecting through the interior and Alaska.

There is always a famine somewhere on this big globe. Never a year passes that thousands do not die of starvation. Too often the number rises to hundreds of thousands. It is in Tonquin, the Chinese province over which the French have set up a Governor General, that the distress is now very great. The harvest this year is a failure, because there was so little rain last year. It is reported that parents are selling their children for a few cents, and pillage is rife. Should cholera be added to the famine, which seems not improbable, the calamity will assume appalling dimensions.

The hotels and boarding-houses in St. Louis Mo., absolutely refuse to receive as guests the coloured delegates to the great National Republican Convention.

A new translation of the English Bible is proposed by Mr. W. H. Horwill in the Contemporary Review, on grounds that will astonish those who have been taught to regard the King James version as a model of English. He makes a single suggestion that nine people out of ten get from the use of "doeth" for "does," "ye" for "you," and such like wording, an idea that Jesus was accustomed to use silted unnatural speech. Mr. Howell adds: "So far as this impression is created, the authorized version gives a false idea of the Bible. And what is almost as bad, it has led the ministry to adopt an unnatural, obsolete style in their sermons that is to-day doing much to alienate the people from the church."

In London, June 10, Mrs. Annie Dyer the Reading baby farmer who presumably had murdered scores of infants entrusted to her care, was hanged in Newgate prison. The woman was completely dazed when she was led to the scaffold, and had to be supported by the wardresses who have had her in charge since she was sentenced to die.

A feature of the present election fight is the large number of campaign buttons worn by the sympathizers of the various parties. They are worn on the lapels by thousands of admirers of the political leaders. The Whitehead and Hogg Company of Toronto, claim to have sold 108,000 buttons in Canada last week alone. A morning paper points out the fact that wearing of party emblems between the day of nomination and polling day is illegal.

Fuenteventura, one of the Canary Islands, has a mystery of the sea, according to the London Daily Mail. A big packing case was recently cast ashore there, which on being opened, was found to contain another wooden box of finer make. Inside this was a zinc box, perfectly water tight, into which had been neatly packed the corpse of a young woman, elegantly dressed, and wearing jewels. The victim had a wound in the forehead, her eyes had been put out; the girl's face was that of a brunette, about twenty years old, with dark hair. She wore a white embroidered bodice, a black silk dress with small red flowers worked as design, black silk stockings, no shoes, and chamois leather gloves. Her earrings were of gold and diamonds. Photographs have been taken of the corpse and will be circulated to try and secure identification.

The London Daily News of Wednesday publishes a despatch from Athens saying that instead of only a few French, British and German engineers being massacred by Kurds on the line of the railway from Smyrna to Kassa, as reported on Sunday last, the number of victims is estimated at two hundred. The Consuls at Smyrna have gone to the scene to investigate the affair.

A queer pig story is told by the London Telegraph. A sow that had lost her tail by accident had a litter of ten little pigs, but, seeing that they all had tails, she placed them in a row and bit off the tails one by one.

It is a constitutional guarantee of the rights of Provincial minorities—Protestant as well as Catholic—and the highest patriotism inspires and compels respect for the letter and spirit of the Constitution.

I confidently await your enlightened and unprejudiced approval of the moderate attitude I have taken on this question.

I will attempt, at public meetings to discuss the political issues of the day, and endeavor to see as many of you, personally, as possible.
