### HOW TO VOTE

The patriotic and intelligent voter in the coming election will not vote on narrow or local grounds. He will not give the vote of a bigot or sectarian. He will remember that ours is a country of different races, languages and creeds; that internal peace and concord are of the first importance and that these can only be maintained by justice to the weak as well as to the strong—to the minority as well as to the majority.

He will vote on the principle of "Canada for the Canadians." No patriotic citizen can be oblivious of the supreme right of Canadian people to all that is best in their own country.—the first right to all her great resources in the soil, the forest, the sea and our vast stores of mineral wealth. Equally they have a first right to our own home market. Our neighbors impose heavy taxes upon all and any of our products which seek their ports and centres of consumption. Why should we not make them pay if they seek to come into our midst to compete with our farmers, fishermen, lumbermen, manufacturers?

As true British subjects the proposal of preferential trade within the empire must commend itself to the mind of the patriotic voter. The idea is a grand one. It may not be capable of immediate realization. That is nothing against it. All great reforms were of slow growth but none the less mighty in their realization. To realize the great idea of preferential trade from which Canada has so much to gain may take years of effort. But the seed has been planted and some of the greatest minds in the imperial councils have been convinced of its practicability and value. It means a British empire in the future which, great as the empire is to-day, will far eclipse all past or present realization.

And then there is the fast Atlantic mail service, now already put on trial by the prudent foresight of our rulers. In this they are but following the lead of nature. Among the features of greatness stamped upon our fair dominion is this that on the east we are nearest Europe, and on the west nearest to China and Japan. The great oceans are narrowest opposite Canadian shores. Already by the splendid C. P. R. steamships the great trans-Pacific highway has become ours. The fast Atlantic line is the bold but natural sequence of what we have already done on the Pacific. We must capture the passenger traffic of the Atlantic! With fast steamers and with hundreds of miles shorter distance in our favor we can and will do it. Costly? Yes! So were the Intercolonial and the Canadian Pacific, yet what Canadian would blot them out?

Great men planned and achieved Confederation and the great public works which make Canada what she is to-day. One of the greatest and most forceful of her sons is to-day at the helm of her affairs, and who will say that the programme he has projected is not worthy of the man and of the country?

The Moniteur Acadien puts to its Acadian readers the following pertinent question: "If you had an important cause to plead before a jury which would you choose to defend your rights, a man like Mr. LeBlanc or an able and intelligent man like Mr. McInerney?" We can well put the same question to our English readers. Surely there is not one among us who would wish to exchange a man like Mr. McInerney for one like Mr. LeBlanc.

Ned Hanlan, the famous oarsman, had a very narrow escape from drowning Thursday morning, at Toronto. He was out in his racing shell with Gus Burrill and was upset in the Eastern gap. After being in the water some time the two oarsmen were picked up exhausted by the steamer Chicora.

During the north east blow on Friday, Messrs. J. & T. Jardine's bark Sagona, which was lying outside the bar, lost one of her bow anchors and 70 fathoms of chain.

Friday's storm was very severe along the coast. Many lobster traps and salmon nets were washed ashore. It is said that some of the lobster fishermen will close down for the season.

Mr. B. Toombs, Moncton is doing a big business in the shipping of eggs, handling all the way from 4000 to 5000 dozen per week. His purchases are made principally from Kent and up north.
