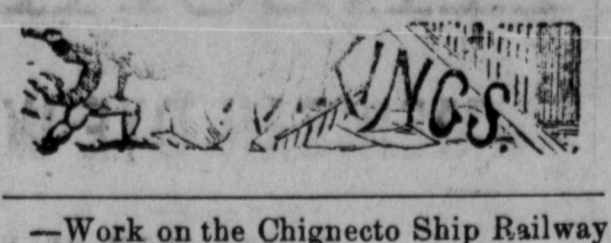

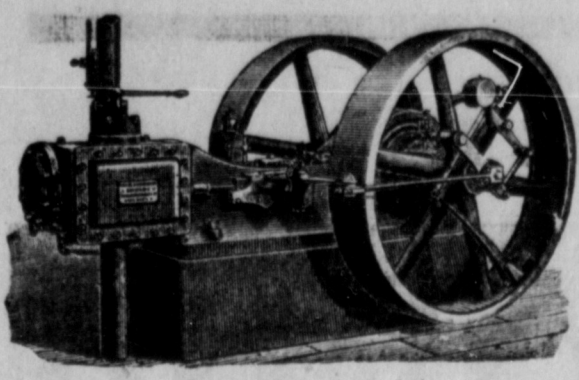

To the Electors of the County of Kent: GENTLEMEN,—Parliament being dissolved, the people are again asked to choose representatives to see after their interests at Ottawa: the day appointed for said choice will be on the 23rd day of June, next.
