-The statistical bulletin of the French Ministry of Agriculture, dealing with the consumption of horse-flesh in Paris last year, gives the number of horses killed for consumption as food at 23,186, this being exclusive of 43 mules and 383 donkeys. The total weight of meat sold was 5,130 tons, and this was sold at 186 shops or stalls, which are not allowed to sell any other kind of meat. The maximum price ranged from 18 cents a pound for the fillet to 4 cents a pound for the neck and lower ribs.' The report adds that not more than a third of the meat is sold at the stalls, the remainder going to make make sausages.

LONDON, Feb. 16 .- A message from the Queen to the Nation was issued this evening. 
