ISTER.It is doubtless not pleasant to anti-
Blair Liberals like Mr. Ellis of the Globe
to see the local premier elevated over their
heads and made sole minister for New
Brunswick in Mr. Laurier's cabinet. But
this seems to be only one of the results of
the triple alliance of provincial premiers
in support of Mr. Laurier, without which
the latter could not have won. It is no
fault of Mr. Blair that he has impressed
the Liberal leader with his weight and in-
fluence more than other members of the
party have. We believe that Mr. Blair
was not himself over anxious to enter the
federal arena. His doing so involves some
sacrifice of personal ease and professional
income. And Mr. Laurier, in selecting
his ministers, naturally looked for strong
and durable cabinet timber rather than
merely the conferring of rewards for past
service. Others may have had stronger
party claims than Mr. Blair. These may
be compensated in another way. In mak-
ing a "ministry of all the talents," Mr.
Laurier found what he wanted in Mr.
Blair.A very great power is placed in the
hands of our one New Brunswick minister
since by the fiat of Mr. Laurier there is to
be but one. He will have practically all
to say about federal appointments and acts
of administration in this province.Doubtless so politic a statesman as Mr.
Blair will freely consult and often be
guided by the opinions of his advisers,
and we are far from thinking that he will
abuse his powers. But it is just as well
for those Liberals who have expectations
of office and who are yet recalcitrant to-
ward our cabinet representative, to re-
member that no man can be appointed
governor, judge, senator, collector or post-
master without his consent or approval.Hon. Mr. Blair has undoubtedly adminis-
trative abilities, and as minister of rail-
ways he has an important department to
direct. There is probably no able man
in the cabinet, and his will is also pre-
eminently strong. It will not therefore
be surprising to find that in shaping the
general course and policy of the govern-
ment, New Brunswick with but one min-
ister will have quite as large a share as
he ever before has had with two minis-
ters at Ottawa. He is resourceful, too,
and when associated with other men of
such staying powers as Messrs. Mowat and
Fielding have proved themselves to
possess, we may believe that they do not
mean to permit themselves to be easily
dislodged from their present advantageous
positions. All of which New Brunswick-
ers, whether Liberal or Tory, would do
well to consider and govern themselves
accordingly.

THE SILVER HERESY.

The adoption of the "free silver"
heresy by the Democratic party is already
producing a plentiful crop of "mug-
wumps." Sound money Democrats,
while they would like to nominate inde-
pendent candidates, yet fear that if they
did so, Bryan might be elected, and hence
a host of them will vote squarely for Mc-
Kinley. But yet the silver heresy will
have a powerful support. In the election
of 1892 the Populists held aloof and nomi-
nated a candidate of their own, for whom
they polled 1,100,000 votes, or one-fifth
as many as elected Grover Cleveland.
Now the Populists generally are support-
ing Bryan. Many Republicans who have
tired of high protection and of bad times
will refuse to vote for such a champion
protectionist as McKinley. And the men
who are in debt, and see a chance under
free silver, to pay off \$1,000 mortgages
with \$500, may be tempted to vote for
Bryan. Party disruption is setting in
strongly and there are grave fears that the
silver candidate, backed as he is by a solid
west and south, may be elected.Children Cry for

THE NEW LOCAL PREMIER.

We notice that the Liberal press of the
province is not very pushing in its greet-
ings to Hon. James Mitchell, who succeeds
Mr. Blair in the local premiership. Per-
contra the Sun takes rather kindly to the
new order of things and shows indications
of relaxing its opposition. The apparent
reason for this change of attitude is that
Mr. Mitchell is a Conservative. Beyond
question he was also one of the soundest,
safest and most moderate men in the late
administration. He is popular, too, and
one who can get along with colleagues, if
they are at all reasonable. The political
complexion of the government as a whole
is but little changed, but there has been a
change of head if not a change of heart,
and it will take some time to find out
what will be the full effect of all this.
His late colleagues seem yet to be in pretty
close accord with the new minister of rail-
ways, but yet the Mitchell government has
somewhat a more Conservative look than
the late Blair government.

ONE SESSION OR TWO.

The holding of a midsummer session of
parliament naturally led many members
to expect two sessions within the year
with the usual accompaniment of indem-
nity and mileage. These hopes are some-
what dashed by a suggestion which Sir
Oliver Mowat has thrown out that parlia-
ment shall be adjourned and not pro-
rogued at close of the short summer ses-
sion. This economical course would save
the country some hundreds of thousands
of dollars, though the M. P.'s and senators
would not fare quite so well as if there
were two full sessions. Sir Oliver's sug-
gestion is in accordance with the course
pursued by the first parliament of the Do-
minion, which met 6th November, 1867,
and on 23rd December adjourned till mid-
winter. But as ministers are prone to be
guided by the wishes of their supporters
it is yet doubtful whether the summer
and winter meetings of parliament will be
treated as one session or two.

MR. McNERNEY AND MR. BLAIR.

Mr. McNerney has requested the RE-
VIEW to give the most absolute denial to
the rumors which may have gained cur-
rency respecting his resignation for the
purpose of opening this Constituency for
Mr. Blair. He wishes us to add that
there is no position in the gift of the
Government which would tempt him to
so traitorously, sell out his Supporters
in this Country. Elected as a conserva-
tive, he represents the political principles
and honor of the party in Kent, and holds
those principles and that honor in too
high esteem to shamefully sacrifice them
for mere personal gain.While it might be an advantage for
Kent to be represented by a Cabinet
minister, the County's honor is a matter
of some importance; and it is not prob-
able that, before very long, Kent's honor
and advantage may be jeopardized and
promoted by being so represented—but not
in the person of A. S. Blair.At a caucus held by the Liberal Con-
servatives at Amherst last Thursday, it was
decided that all seats held by the Liberals
in Nova Scotia should be protested. Sir
C. H. Tupper and Hon. A. R. Dickie
were present.

New Government Sworn in Friday.

FREDERICTON, July 17.—Yesterday af-
ternoon Hon. A. G. Blair tendered to the
Lt. Governor his resignation as Premier
and advised His Honor to call on Hon.
James Mitchell to form a government.
Mr. Blair's resignation was accepted, and
Mr. Mitchell was called on to form a govern-
ment, which he did. The members
of the new administration were sworn in
by Lt. Governor Fraser shortly before
one o'clock to-day:Hon. James Mitchell, Premier and At-
torney General.Hon. Lemuel J. Tweedie, Provincial
Secretary.Hon. Henry R. Emmerson, Chief Com-
missioner of Public Works.

Hon. A. T. Dunn, Surveyor General.

Hon. A. S. White, Solicitor General.

Hon. C. H. Labllois, member without
portfolio.The remaining force of the seat will not
be filled until the next meeting of the
executive. It is said it will go to either
Porter, Dibblee or Ferris.Mr. Wm. Walker, of Spring Brook
who died on the 14th inst at the early age
of 36 years, left a void in the community
which will not soon be filled. He had
gone to Lower Stewiacke, Nova Scotia to
visit his brothers and to receive medical
treatment, his health having been poor of
late. He was seized quite suddenly with
severe illness which turned to inflam-

not recover.Mr. Walker was ordained to the elder-
ship on the 12th May 1889, and discharged
his duties faithfully. He superintended
the Sunday School in South Branch and
was always to be depended upon in the
prayer meetings and in fact in all other
religious effort.A man of a mild, gentle, and truly
Christian spirit, he made no enemies and
was the friend of all. His life was a pat-
tern to young men. He died calmly
trusting in the Saviour with whom he

had been walking while in life.

Among his last requests were that Mrs.
Palmer should superintend the Sabbath
School, that the 17th chap. of St. John
should be read at his funeral and that the
5th Hymn in the Psalter should be read
to him.The sympathy of the whole community
goes out to the bereaved family.

Hanson, the murderer of James Mullin
of Segniud Falls, Ont., has been sentence
to be hanged October 16.Joseph H. Williams, ex-governor of
Maine at his home in Augusta on Sunday,
aged 82 years.Patrick Fitzpatrick, a brakeman on
freight train, and a friend, Joseph Acton,
riding with him, were struck by an over-
head bridge at Attleboro, Mass., Saturday
night and killed.Car barns of the Chicago City Railway
Company were destroyed by fire Satur-
day night. One hundred open cars, 180
closed cars and about 50 grip cars were
burned, besides 50 horses, a large amount
of feed and other supplies. Loss about
\$350,000.Queen Victoria will act as umpire in
the arbitration of the frontier dispute be-
tween Chili and the Argentine Republic.The Cuban insurgents won a decisive
victory over the Spanish forces on July
15 in the province of Pinar del Norte.
The Spaniards were commanded by Gen-
eral Inclan, who was taken prisoner and
will be held as a hostage. The insurgents
arranged an ambush and the troops were
led into the trap, when fire was opened
upon them, about 300 being killed and
wounded.
