## At 66 Much Per Prayer.

At Hamilton, Ont., July 13, the inquest on the death of Charles Embury, the eight-months-old child of Hedley J. Embury, who was treated by Christian Scientists for diarrhoea, was resumed at No. 3 police station before Coroner White. The father of the child testified that the child was taken ill a week ago Thursday and died last Tuesday.

Its mother had said the child had diarrhoea. Christian Science treatment from Mrs. Wilson, who prayed for the child and charged \$1 per visit, was the only treatment the child received. The mother testified that the treatment given the child was silent prayer, no medicine having been given or change made in the child's diet.

Mrs. Wilson, the Christian Scientist, testified to giving the child more than the ordinary treatment, which was half an hour, the case being serious. She and her husband had a good practice in the city, and they had more recoveries than the doctors. Christian Science could mend bones, she said. She referred to a case of dislocated shoulder in Toronto which the science had cured. The death of the Embury child was due to metaphysical causes.

Drs. Farewell and Anderson testified that the child's death was due to diarrhoea.

Following is the verdict of the jury: "We are of the unanimous opinion that Charles H. Embury died from inflammation of the bowels, aggravated by lack of proper medical treatment, and we believe the parents of the child were culpably negligent. We recommend the Crown Attorney to make further inquiries in the matter. We also strongly denounce the practices of the Christian Scientists, as brought out in the evidence at this inquest."

## A Find Of Gold.

MISSION CITY, B. C., July 17.—A rich gold quartz discovery has just been made a few miles northwest of Mission City, about seven miles north of the Wharmock station. The lucky locators are George Walden and Adolphus Williams, M. P. P. The assays made show a value of \$152.60 per ton—7 oz. in gold and 6½ oz. in silver. There is a clear defined seam of eight feet, which has been traced for over a mile. The locators expect to start development work at once. It has been a known fact that rich ledges must exist in the range of mountains back of Mission City, for reports of creek washings and black sand have frequently been brought in by prospectors, which run from \$1.50 to \$6 per ton.

This is a very important discovery, not only for Mission city, but for Vancouver as we are only 42 miles from the coast. It also goes to confirm the theory that the range of mountains leading direct from Frail and Rossland (which the London expert mining engineers only recently pronounced to be the richest gold mining district in the world) extends to this coast. This item may be of interest to many of the Star readers, for a number of Montreal people are largely interested in Vancouver and Mission City, and British Columbia.
