

FIRE AT COCAGNE.—At Cocagne last Wednesday, Babineau's grist mill, shingle mill and blacksmith shop were completely destroyed by fire. It is not known how the conflagration originated. The loss will be heavy as there is no insurance.

A NEW VARIETY OF POTATO BUG.—The Sussex Record says :- Mr. Joseph Yeomans, of Upper Coiner, is showing what is said to be a new species of potato bug. The insect is much more active than the one that has done so much damage to potato fields in the past, and if the destructiveness of the new kind is to be measured by its activity as contrasted with the old species, then we say much greater danger exists for the safety of potato fields than ever before. Searching parties were immediately organized but the body has not yet been found. Mr. Casey was single and was a son of Damien Casey. He was of a mild and even temperment and of a cheerful and pleasant disposition and was very popular among his acquaintances to whom his sudden death was a terrible blow.

## THE WIDE, WIDE WORLD

London, July 4.—A letter from Mr. Gladstone is published to-day denouncing the whole increase of expenditure on armaments as wild, wanton and perilous; but it fails to evoke any sympathy. The public is more moved by a serious article from the the pen of Sir Charles Dilke, just published, predicting that Great Britain, single handed is destined to engagin a great struggle against Germany Russia and France combined. The fight, he claims, may come at any time within a decade, ostensibly about Egypt ; but really on account of jealousy of Great Britain's colonial expansion. Therefore Sir Charles urges Great Britain to hold herself free from any alliances which might only prove illusive, and devote herself to the devélopment of her defences.

Philadelphia, July 5.—Iwo murders were committed within two hours of each other and at places only a few squares apart, last night. Bartholomew Chambley, aged 28 years, received a fatal blow during a brawl and died this morning. Joseph Kennedy, 24 years old, is under arrest for the crime.

Liquor was also the cause of the second murder. James London, aged 23, was shot through the heart by Jacob C Hare, aged 23, who is at large. Both men are colored.

Russelville, Ky., July 5.-A deadly duel took place near Adairville yesterday morning. Dock Younger went to town drunk, and as he rode out of town he fired his pistol. H. H. Harmon, the town marshal, jumped on a horse and started after Younger. An hour later both men were found dead about a mi'e from town. Both had been show through the heart, and only one chamber in each revolver had been discharged.

QUEBEC, July 5 .- News has reached here from River Moisie, North Shore, to the effect that a whole family of Naskouapi Indians were starved to death some fifteen -Mrs L. T. Joudry and family have days ago. A party of hunters from Moisie found the remains of seven persons some two hundred miles in the interior. The remains were those of the Cietinau family father, mother, and five children. The squaw had written a few notes in the Naskouapi tongue which told of the terrible ordeal which the family had suffered since the fall of 1895.


