THE SCHOOL LAW.

The remedial bill has been launched upon the troubled sea of Parliament. It is being buffeted by adverse waves of popular feeling; and although it is being driven by favorable Conservative breezes, it is extremely difficult at this writing to judge of its ultimate fate. The measure seems to be favored by the majority of Canadians although it has many and powerful opponents. Many Conservatives who would otherwise oppose the bill, seem willing to tolerate it because it is offered by their party. The bill contains over one hundred clauses, many of which will, no doubt, be discussed at great length. It would seem an easy matter for the opponents of the bill to prolong the debates on its many clauses until the natural life of the present parliament will have expired. This will occur about April 26th next. In that case the House would have to go to the country on it and there is no telling what would then take place. No doubt the minority in Manitoba or any other province has rights that ought to be respected, but under the present state of affairs the Manitobans are as well off as either the people of New Brunswick or Prince Edward Island. The school law in these latter provinces gives reasonable satisfaction; but nearly every grown person will recollect the opposition with which the common schools were met with in New Brunswick. After the opponents of the law were compelled to succumb to the inevitable, many who had before been its most bitter opponents became its warmest friends. It will perhaps turn out the same in Manitoba.

W. H. Drummond has a poem in Massey's magazine entitled, "How Bateese Came Home" which is a treat in its way. It is written as a French Canadian would speak English and tells of a French Canadian who had been sojourning in the United States during the good times of a few years ago. The Opposition View.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 21.—Dr. Alward spoke at some length in the House yesterday in reply to the Provincial Secretary. It was a matter for regret, he said, that the financial affairs of the province were in everything but a prosperous condition. It was a matter for regret that year after year the province was going more deeply into debt, and that year after year the amount required to pay the interest upon our bonded obligations was increasing. That states of affairs could not much longer continue. Contrasted with one notable exception, our position was not a desirable one. Year after year the finances of the great province of Ontario were improving—annual surpluses were announced—and so it was with Nova Scotia. The Legislature of Nova Scotia prorogued the other day, and instead of facing a deficit the government were able to boast of a surplus of \$4,235. The manner in which the public accounts of that province were kept were much preferable to our own. Could the Hon. Provincial Secretary tell what the deficit was for the past year? The account of the Auditor General had been in the hands of the hon. members for some days, but no one could tell just what the deficit was. Dr. Alward made out from the different statements that the deficit was \$72,549. That was not a state of affairs that was desirable for this province. Testing it by the statement of net debt for the two years, the province had gone behind to the tune of \$63,000. The speaker then went on to compare the present position of the province with what it was six years ago when the Provincial Secretary delivered his budget speech. That honorable gentleman had inherited so to speak from his predecessor in office a surplus on the operations of the year 1889 of \$11,176. He spoke in the most hopeful terms of the healthy condition of the finances. How had his predictions been verified? He has gone on every year predicting surpluses, but has year after year to face a deficit. He has been optimistic, but in the meantime the province has been plunging rapidly into debt. When the hon. gentleman delivered that budget speech in 1890 the interest charge of the province was \$101,225; to-day it was \$117,192, according to the Auditor's report, and to that must be added the interest on bonds issued for importation of horses, \$1,350, and also interest on bonds issued by the Board of Works, \$9,740, making the full amount of interest chargeable the present year \$128,932. On Dec. 31st, 1890, the net debt was \$1,691,064; in 1891 it was \$1,894,091; in 1892 it was \$2,163,228; in 1893 it was \$2,183,563; in 1894, \$2,252,829; in 1895, \$2,321,412. Every year the net debt had been rolling up and as a consequence the amount expended for interest. On the average during those six years the net debt had increased \$1,050,000 a year. The average increase in interest was \$4,626. Would any business man consider that his affairs were in a satisfactory condition if they made such a showing? Would any of the honest farmers of the House feel satisfied if they found that every year they were placing an extra mortgage upon their farms? The income for the year 1885 was \$687,437; the interest charge was \$128,982, or nearly one-fifth of the whole amount.

Hon. Mr. Blair—We ought to abolish the interest. It is a great nuisance. Dr. Alward said this was the alarming condition of affairs notwithstanding the fact that the government had largely increased their revenue. They had made a saving by the abolition of the Legislative Council, notwithstanding the unnecessary law clerk, and the additional members added to this House, not of \$12,000, as some hon. members had claimed, but of \$7,000. In addition to that the government had the advantage of the payment by the counties for the maintenance of the pauper insane. It was true this was not a large amount, but a saving had been thus effected. Then the government had obtained a large accession of income from the tax upon incorporated companies and the succession duties. The tax upon incorporated companies yielded the government last year \$27,755; the succession duties, \$9,729.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell—It is not correct to place the receipts from incorporated companies at \$27,000. The fiscal year was changed last year, and we only had the receipts from this source for one-half the year. Last session the law was changed requiring the companies to pay the whole amount in one annual payment instead of two half-yearly payments, so you have included in that statement the half of 1894 and the whole of 1895.

Dr. Stockton—But you estimate them at \$24,000 for the current year. Hon. Mr. Blair—It would be fair to place the amount at the two-thirds of the \$27,000 if the honorable member is going to claim that the government is in receipt of that much additional revenue.

Dr. Alward said in 1890 the Provincial Secretary stated that in consequence of the impetus which would be imparted to the lumber industry, there would be no decrease in stumpage. Had that been verified? In 1889 there was received from stumpage \$113,322, in 1890, \$110,897; in the year following it was only \$81,000. In 1892 it was \$96,000. Then I find that in 1894, for the ten months, the amount was \$65,401. This year it is \$100,000. Could the province be said to be in a proper financial condition when it had to

face a yearly deficit, and when the interest charge was encroaching upon the legitimate expenditures that should be made upon the roads and bridges and the farming industries of the country?

Mr. Mitchell—What about the elevator? Dr. Alward—I will ask the hon. member what about the Union wharf? Why have you not paid the \$1,000 to the city of St. John?

Mr. Mitchell—I observe by the newspapers that the Common Council of St. John have directed their Chamberlain to notify the government that Union wharf is at length completed, and to ask the government for the subsidy.

Dr. Stockton—That is as insisted upon by the government contrary to the act passed.

Mr. Mitchell—Not at all. When that notification comes we will send an engineer down and have the work inspected, and if it is completed the bonus will be paid, and that will add another \$1,000 to the bonded debt of the province each year for the next twenty years.

Dr. Alward said the bonded indebtedness of the province, according to the Auditor General's report, was \$2,759,000. This was a matter for serious consideration and hon. members might well ask themselves whether we could go on in this way without resorting to direct taxation. Already we had resorted to that. The tax imposed upon banks and insurance companies was a direct tax, and, notwithstanding that the government had resorted to this species of taxation, there was a deficit year after year. That tax would have to be increased and when it had reached a point beyond which it could not be applied the government would have to resort to other means for an income and then it would fall upon the farmers of the country to support and maintain their roads and bridges out of their own pockets. Reference had been made by the hon. Provincial Secretary to the Province of Nova Scotia and he stated that we pay more for education than that province.

The Armenian Atrocities. BOSTON, Feb. 24.—A Bostonian in Constantinople under date of Feb. 7, writes: I send a copy of the latest dreadful statistics from the province of Harpoot. These statistics were prepared by a friendly Moslem. They are the principal statistics attainable up to Jan. 15, of the Turkish atrocities in the province:— Armenian Christians killed, 29,544; Armenian Christians burned, 1,383; teachers, preachers and priests killed, 51; died from hunger and cold, 3,266; found dead in fields and on roads, 4,330; died from fear, 760; total deaths, 39,334; wounded, 8,000; houses burned, 58,592; forced conversions to Islam, 15,379; churches, schools and monasteries destroyed, 227; women and girls outraged, 530; women and girls married by force to Turks, 1,532; absolutely destitute, 5,450. These figures indicate about a third of the total losses of Armenians from October 9 to January 15 1896.
