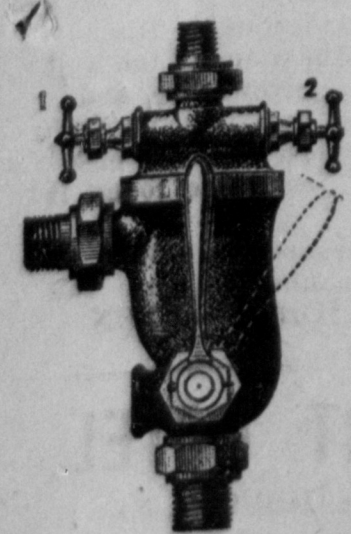

The owl's antics were ended, and he paid the penalty for his continued attacks upon what he deemed an intruder upon his dark domain. **Money Needed at Pompeii.**

Is there no "loyal European"—to adopt Talleyrand's phrase—who is rich enough and sufficiently public-spirited to furnish substantial aid to the excavations at Pompeii? The operations which have now been in progress for nearly a century and a half, contributing so largely to our knowledge of the public and private life of the Roman people, are interesting not to the Italian nation only, but to the whole world; yet Italy bears the cost, and she has but little money just now to spare for objects that are of prime necessity. Mr. Fitzgerald Marriott tells us that all the Italian Government is now contributing is about 8,000 lire—equal to £304 a year—and that the receipts at the gates of the ancient city do not go to the place itself but to the Central Administration in Rome, who distribute it to different centers throughout the kingdom where similar excavations are going on.

The latest of the houses discovered in buried Pompeii is as yet only partially unearthed, but the clearings have already brought to light a remarkable number of painted fresco panels and pictures; together with friezes ornamented with beautiful designs. The most noteworthy of the art treasures revealed are three pictures, each more than three feet in height by only a trifle less in breadth. One represents Jove watching in astonishment the infant Hercules strangling the serpents. Almena looks on from behind the throne. The subject of another is Amphion and Zethus binding Dirce to the bull, and that of the third is the death of Pentheus, the young King of Thebes, slain by his mother, sisters and aunt during their Bacchanalian orgies, in revenge for his resisting the introduction of the rites of Bacchus into his kingdom. The coloring of the latter picture is said to be very delicate. To the effective massing of the figures and the striking vigor of the composition in general photographic reproductions bear testimony.—Collector.

**Raised the Subscription.**

An amusing story concerning a recent occurrence in a Protestant church in the North of Ireland is going the rounds. The story goes that the chapel belonging to a certain district was greatly in need of repair, and a meeting was called to consider the matter and open a subscription list. Naturally enough those in charge invited an influential and very wealthy local gentleman to preside, in hope that he would lead the list with a large donation. Much to their disgust that worthy, after a plausible oration, concluded by stating he would subscribe £5. Shortly afterwards a portion of the ceiling fell on the bald pate of the chairman, who thereupon much to the satisfaction of all concerned, immediately rose and stated he would increase his subscription to £50. After the applause which greeted this announcement had subsided, a pious old gentleman seated in the body of the hall was heard to exclaim with much fervor: "Lord, strike him again!"

**A Lost Opportunity.**

Finally one of the spectators accidentally glanced at the exhibitor's face, and noticing that she was chewing gum, remarked to a companion: "Say! there is a lost opportunity; some chewing gum manufacturer would have paid good money for a placard announcing that his was the chosen chew." 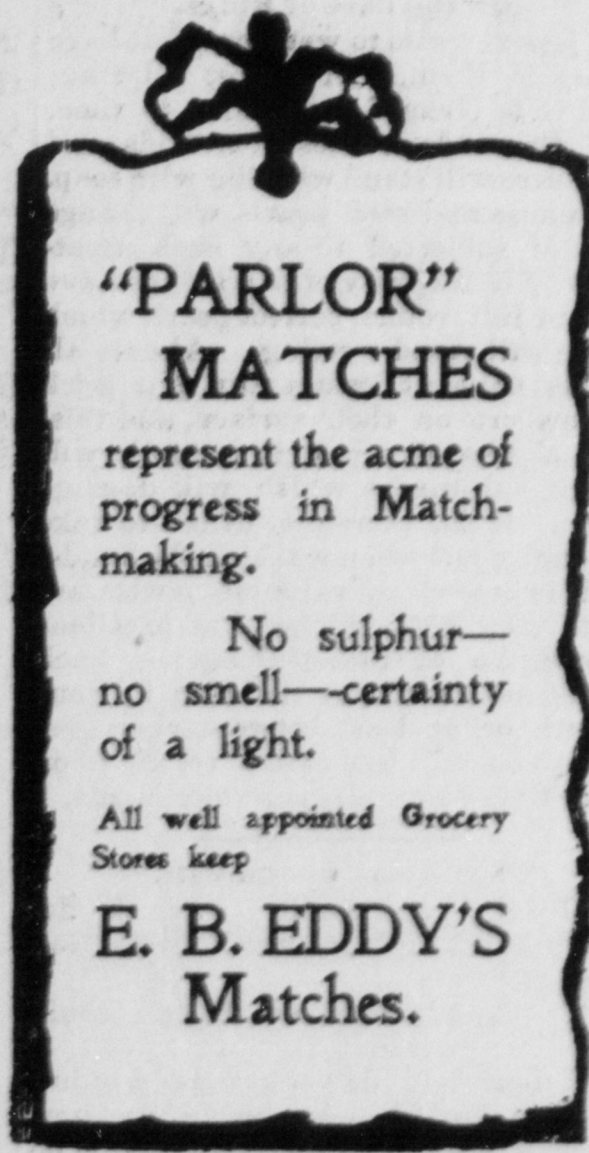
