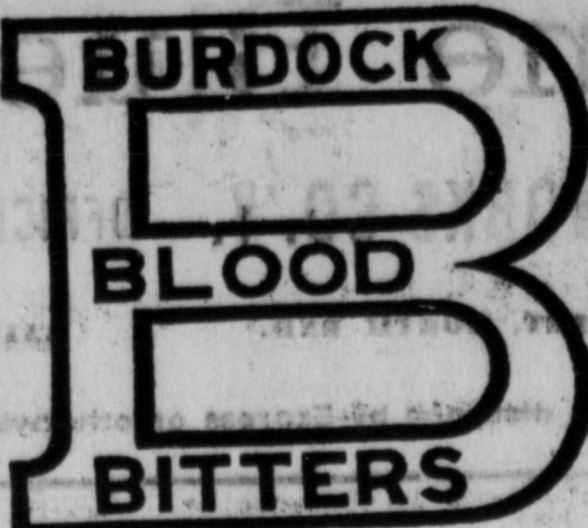

PROVINCIAL FINANCES.

MR. MITCHELL EXPLAINS THE SITUATION. And Speaks Hopefully of the Future—Money goes into Supply.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 20.—This afternoon Provincial Secretary Mitchell submitted the estimates of the money required for the services of the province (not otherwise provided for) for the current year as follows:

Mr. Mitchell, in making his budget speech, said that as a Conservative he gave the Dominion government a large amount of the credit for the manner in which the country had stood the commercial strain of the last two years.

At the close of last year the bonded indebtedness stood at \$2,675,000. This debt had been increased to the extent of \$84,000, making in all \$2,759,000.

The actual increase, however, has been \$67,000, made up of \$18,000 for Woodstock bridge, \$25,000 for international bridges, \$20,000 for Nelson and Black Brook Railway.

\$1,000 on the Moncton-Buctouche road, and \$3,000 for St. John elevator. During the year there were issued \$118,000 of redeemed debentures.

The debentures floated were 12 per cents, to meet six per cents, falling due, and they sold on the market at from 2.25 to 2.30 premium.

The saving thus effected in annual interest would be two per cent., or \$2,180 the interest on the additional bonds that were issued would be \$2,680, so that the net increase of interest on the year's operation would be \$500.

The net total indebtedness of the province at the close of 1894 was \$2,252,829.83; at the close of the present year it was \$2,321,412.66, an increase of \$68,582.83, of which sum, as already stated, \$67,000 was covered by the additional bonds.

The sinking fund had been added to, so that it now comprised \$28,000 upon horse importations, \$22,503 upon bridges and \$9,500 for debt falling due in December last, making a total of \$60,003.

Turning to a current account, Mr. Mitchell said the receipts for last year were \$687,437.44, while the warrant expenditure was \$684,634.88, leaving a surplus of 2,802.56.

Territorial revenue had been estimated at \$145,000, but had reached \$151,273.60 an advance over 1894 of \$6,273.60, which was almost entirely due to increased mileage and stumps.

ent sections of the country. In pursuing this plan the government were profiting by the experience of the older provinces. The dairy products of the province had increased very largely within the last few years.

Mr. Mitchell referred at some length to the cheese and butter industry, and spoke in a complimentary way of the St. John exhibition. Referring to the school for horticulture at Wolfville he said it was the government's purpose to set aside a small appropriation for those who desired to attend the Wolfville school.

The government had in contemplation to make an importation of cattle, sheep and swine during the present year. The amount estimated for the Boys' Industrial Home had been \$1,500, but only \$250 had been expended. He had placed \$500 in the estimates for that object this year, but it was possible that amount would be exceeded.

The expenditures on contingencies, public printing and legislation were about the same as in previous years. One of the largest items of expenditure was education. In 1881 the school grant was \$153,529.56; in 1892 it was \$157,889.07; last year it was about \$32,000 more.

This increase was due to the increased number of schools, and to the very gratifying fact that the number of first and second-class teachers was increasing, while those of the third-class were decreasing in number.

This province pays more per capita for education than any other province in the Dominion, and three times as much as Ontario. Another heavy item of expenditure and one of the most troublesome was that of public works. Last year the over-expenditure in this department was \$34,414.71, part of which was owing to the over-expenditure of 1894.

In that year there was a warrant-expenditure above the estimate of \$35,000; in 1893 the over-expenditure was \$16,371. It would therefore seem that it was impossible to carry on the public works of the province efficiently with the grant that was given yearly.

Last year an extra call was made upon the department by reason of the freshet in the early spring. It was also to be considered that the class of bridges generally being put up throughout the province were much superior to those built formerly.

Passing on Mr. Mitchell said that stumpage collection for the year had cost \$9,500, which large amount was owing to the increased cut of lumber. The Surveyor General had also expended a considerable amount on running out block lines as fast as new areas were taken up.

The necessity arose for running these lines in order that the purchasers might know where their lines were. Mr. Mitchell then enumerated the estimated receipts for the current year as given in the printed list. The estimate for agriculture was \$24,150, the increase in which item was in order to meet the appropriation for the St. John exhibition of \$3,000 under the legislation of last session; for contingencies an additional amount was asked; owing in part to the additional number of representatives for education, \$155,914.45 was asked, based on the calculation of the Chief Superintendent.

For elections the sum of \$6,000 was set aside. It was possible that some hon. members might feel called upon to aspire to a higher sphere at the coming Dominion election. For executive government, \$25,430 was asked, about the same as last year; fishery protection, \$1,200, an increase of \$200 over last year, and about the same as was usually expended. For game protection \$2,000 was asked. Nearly that amount was expended last year with very satisfactory results.

For interest on bonded debt \$117,000 would be required. For Lunatic Asylum \$2,000 more was asked than for last year, when there was an over-expenditure of this amount. For the Natural History Society \$125 was proposed, and at the urgent solicitation of the leader of the opposition and others \$125 had been allotted for the New Brunswick Historical Society. The estimated receipts in all are \$698,155.82, and the estimated expenditure \$691,879.48.

Dr. Stockton asked if the \$18,000 bonds issued for the Woodstock bridge was additional to the \$150,000 authorized for the construction of that bridge? Mr. Mitchell said no; it was included in the \$150,000. The total bonds issued and sold amounted to \$150,000, which comprised \$109,000 of redemption bonds, \$18,000 for Woodstock bridge and \$25,000 upon international bridges.

Dr. Stockton—On page 229 of the auditor general's report you issue \$99,500 bonds for redemption of the six per cent. bonds, but in the account you appear to have only redeemed \$32,000.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell—There was \$7,700 that had not come in at the end of the fiscal year. They have been paid since the close of the fiscal year.

The debate was resumed by Dr. Alward and Messrs. Emmerson, Pitts and Veniot. The motion that Mr. Speaker leave the chair was carried, and the House went into committee of supply, Mr. Killam in the chair.

All the items of supply were passed, with the exception of those for public works and lunatic asylum maintenance, over till to-morrow, when further consideration of supply stands as the order of the day.

Dr. Stockton congratulated the government upon the grants for the library and Historical Society. Hon. Mr. Mitchell thanked the leader of the opposition for these congratulations, the first that had come from him since he ceased to support the government.
