**Forty-Two Years of Public Life.**

It was just forty-two years ago to-day that Sir Charles Tupper first entered public life as the representative of Cumberland county in the Nova Scotia assembly. He proved at once a most able lieutenant to the late Hon. Mr. Johnson and soon succeeded him as the Conservative leader. His forty-two years have been a lifetime of hard work, every moment having been devoted to the public service. He never experienced a personal defeat, and the party he was connected with only sustained two defeats during his whole public life, one before Confederation in Nova Scotia politics when the Protestant Alliance was worked against him, and once in 1874, in a Dominion election.

Sir Charles Tupper is to-day one of the best known, most influential and most successful colonial statesmen of the century. Now, when in his 75th year—he will be 75 next July—he is personally conducting a campaign with seemingly unimpaired vigor. He is, indeed, a wonderful man.

—The St. Nicholas River cheese factory will begin operations to-day, June 1st.

—The World's Fair medals and diplomas won by Canadians have reached Ottawa.

—Messrs. W. S. Loggie & Co shipped their first shipment of salmon from here on Thursday.

—A number of the young folk of Kingston drove up to Mill Creek and attended the basket social held there on Thursday evening.

—A soiree was held at St. Margaret's R. C. church on Sunday last. About eighty dollars were realized which will go towards the church.

—Lady Tupper is arranging to leave London for Canada in July, which is taken to mean that Sir Charles Tupper will not visit England this year.

—Norwegian brig Camilla, 318 tons, before reported ashore in the Miramichi, became a total wreck, and was sold at auction by the captain. No insurance.

—Grace Schloenbeck, a Chicago girl of fourteen, twice attempted suicide in the lagoon in Jackson's park because her mother gave her a severe whipping and turned her out of doors.

—Peter Wheeler, who has been under arrest charged with murdering Annie Kempton, at Bass River, N. S., has been taken to Kentville, where his trial begins, to-morrow.

—Messrs. J. & T. Jardine killed all their stock of cattle on Wednesday. It will be remembered that the whole herd of about 20 head of pure bred Ayrshires were afflicted with tuberculosis.

—Mr. Wm. Jardine, of Jardineville has been appointed By Road Commissioner for district No. 3, Parish of Richibucto instead of Mr. Anthony McNair, resigned.

—There was a lively fracas in Kingston on Saturday night, in which a large number of the most muscular of the citizens took part. Some of the participants got a bad breaking up.

—The Richibucto A. D. club have begun practising for a new play called the Deacon which they intend to present in the Temperance hall on the evening of Dominion Day, July 1st.

—The General Electrical Society announce that an improvement has been made in the Roentgen process that enables the interior of the head, the larynx and the action of the lungs and the heart to be observed on a fluorescent screen.

—While returning from church on Friday evening, Mrs. Henry O'Leary was seized with an attack of heart disease and it was thought that she was dying. Dr. Bourque was sent for and rendered the necessary medical attendance. The patient has fully recovered.

—Messrs. Graham and David Jardine, of Jardineville arrived home on Wednesday from Mount Allison, where they had been attending college. Mr. Graham completed a commercial course and received a diploma. David is in his senior year and will graduate B. A. next year.

—Mr. Keady Lanigan's schooner, Tartar, Capt. Wade, grounded while entering the harbour through the Albion channel, Friday afternoon, and remained aground until sometime in the night when she was floated. There was a heavy sea at the time the vessel struck and she pounded considerably, and is a good deal injured.

—The funeral of the late Mrs. Robert Little, which took place on Sunday afternoon, was very largely attended. Sixty carriages, besides a large number on foot, accompanied the remains to the grave. Rev. Wm. Hamilton conducted the services. The pallbearers were, Messrs. Robt. Lennox, Alex. Lennox, H. M. Ferguson, Robert Law, Wm. T. Girvan and Hazen Russ.

—Peter Blakley, one of the oldest and wealthiest citizens of Parrsboro, was robbed Tuesday night of \$11,000 in deposit receipts and \$500 in cash. He had just taken rooms at the Queen hotel Monday night, and had the receipts and money in a valise, which was unlocked, the contents taken out and the valise locked again. He has wired and notified the banks which issued them not to pay them, and is making every effort to find the robber, but so far has been unsuccessful.

—Mr. Thomas Clayton, of Marysville York County, is exporting frogs to New York and Pennsylvania from streams along the Canada Eastern Railway. He has orders to ship fifty dozen per week from now until October 1st, which shows that the Americans are fond of the New Brunswick frog. Mr. Clayton will have twenty-five men engaged all summer fishing for these animals, which are very plentiful in all the streams hereabouts. He catches and lands them at their destination alive and in good condition.

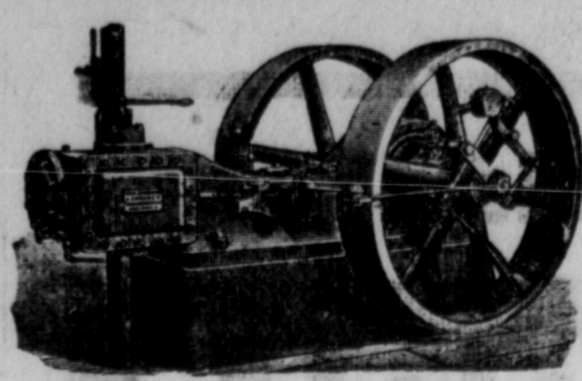
