**PORT OF RICHIBUCTO.**—Arrived June 2, Sch. Lochiel, Wright, from I. E. Island, bal.; Sch. Atalanta, 95 tons, McMillan, from Isaac's Harbour, N. S., bal.

The following square rigged vessels have sailed for Richibucto: Norwegian barks, Norden, from Conway, May 15; Glommen, from Penzance, May 23; Sigrid, from Lowestoft, May 23.

**CAPSIZE.**—Sch. Willie D., Capt. Bulterwell, from Stamford, Conn., and for Parrsboro, N. S., light, capsized at 6 o'clock Sunday morning, about three miles west of Point Judith, during a westerly squall. The captain and two seamen clung to the capsized vessel several hours and were nearly exhausted when rescued by the steamer Pentagoet, New York for Eastport, Me. William Spinnery, seamen, aged about 30, a resident of Parrsboro, was drowned. The survivors were landed at Vineyard Haven by the Pentagoet. They saved nothing. The Willie D., registered 90 tons, was launched at Parrsboro, N. S., April 1. The vessel was returning home from her first trip. Steam tug Joshua Lovett has left to look for the schooner.

## The Situation at St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 30.—Dr. Starkloff, Health Commissioner and chief of the hospital service in this city, this morning, forced to the conclusion that the deaths at the city hospital are far beyond first estimates. He reluctantly states that fifty patients of the hospital are not accounted for. Dr. Sutter, superintendent of the hospital, says that a number of patients fled to the Commons about the place, and there is a hope that many of the fifty missing from the hospital will be found among the charitable people of the vicinity. Health Commissioner Starkloff and Dr. Sutter both declare that there is a strong probability that the bodies of some of the missing patients will be found in the ruins.

At East St. Louis two companies of the Illinois State Militia, from Greenville and Belleville, in all about 100 men, patrolled the levee district last night. "Dead lines" were established and no one was allowed to pass without a permit. The effect of these stringent measures was soon seen to be in the greatly decreased number of people in the devastated districts. Over sixty suspects have already been arrested and have been sent out of town or locked up. Several pick-pockets and confidence men have also been arrested.

At least 400 freight cars were overturned and either wholly or partially demolished. The situation in St. Louis this morning, as viewed from the Republic's standpoint is as follows:

St. Louis, identified dead, 186; unknown dead, 18; missing, 33; fatally injured, 19; seriously injured in hospital, 401; estimated injured outside of hospitals, 1000. Property loss estimated at \$20,000,000.

East St. Louis, identified dead, 110; unknown dead, 6; dying, 6; missing, 10; seriously injured, in hospitals, 200; estimated injured, outside of hospitals, 2000; property loss, \$5,000,000. Total dead and dying, 205.

The character of the work done yesterday in all that southwestern part of the city included within a half dozen blocks about Lafayette Park, was in marked contrast to that performed in the less wealthy district visited by the storm. Carpenters were at work on unroofed houses. Hundreds of moving vans were backed up against the front doors of

wrecked homes. There were express wagons, coal waggons, hand carts and contrivances which the residents of the district never saw before. On nearly every house surrounding the park carpenters and repairers were at work.

The reckage at the parks is enormous. In Benton Park 226 trees were levelled to the ground, all the shrubbery, plants and flowers destroyed and the lawns rooted up. It will take years to replace the trees. The greatest damage in Forest Park was caused by the unprecedented sudden rise in the river Desperes.

Shortly after midnight Rev. Father J. J. Head, pastor of Annunciation church, 6th and LaSalle streets, died of the injuries received by falling timbers in the disaster Wednesday night.

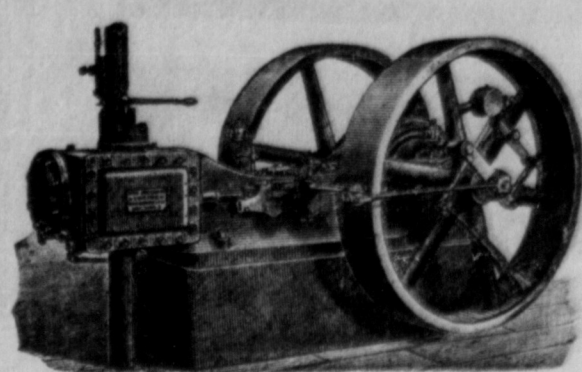
