### St. Joseph's College.

MAY 29th.—About half-past six o'clock on the morning of the 27th inst. Rev. Father Bazoge, one of the curates of the Parish, was found dead in bed in his room in the Presbytery. On the previous night the Rev. Father had been called to the bedside of a dying man and reached home only at 11 o'clock, when he immediately retired. As he did not make his usual early appearance next morning, Brother Alexander went to his room and found him dead. The body was still warm when found and death had occurred probably not two hours before. The cause of death was heart disease to which, it was generally known, Father Bazoge was subject.

The funeral took place to-day at 10 o'clock. The parish church, where the services were conducted, was draped in black and was completely filled with people. Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. F. X. Cormier, of Aboujagat, with Father Savage, of Sussex, as Deacon and Father DuFour, of Shediac, as Sub-deacon. The funeral oration was delivered by Rev. Father Girard, C. S. C., and was a touching and fitting tribute to the departed priest. The pall-bearers were, Mr. S. Gaudet, Jno. McManus, V. Gaudet, Austin LeBlanc, Jno. Gaudet and C. Gaudet. Among the priests present were, Rev. Father Roy, C. S. C., Superior of the College, and Fathers O'Neill, C. S. C., Guertin, C. S. C., Bourgeois, Berthelme, C. S. C., and LeBlanc C. S. C., of the College, Father Bellevue, of Barachois, Father Legere, of Fox Creek, Father Masse or Grandigue and Father L'Abbe de Memramcook. Besides these there were many prominent laymen from different parts of the province.

The deceased priest was born at Beaumont-on-Sarthe, France, on the 22nd of September, 1831. He spent the latter days of his youth at Mans, where he enlisted in 1852 in the 95th Regiment of Ligne. In 1854 he accompanied his regiment to Crimea, where he served with distinction being several times promoted and being also the recipient of an honor medal. He was present at the siege of Sebastopol, where indeed he was wounded. Shortly afterwards his regiment was ordered to France. Leaving the army he returned to Mans, where he joined the religious Congregation of Holy Cross and was ordained priest in 1862. During the same year he came to Canada and taught at St. Laurent College, Montreal, after a years stay in Montreal he was transferred to St. Joseph's College, Memramcook, where he remained two years after which he was stationed at Barachois for five years. He subsequently attended to the spiritual wants of several parishes in Madawaska County, and in 1876 he was put in charge of the parish of Cocagne, where he remained until 1885. In that year he was called to Memramcook as assistant priest and has since remained here residing in the Presbytery near the parish church. Deceased was of an affable and genial disposition, was kind hearted and affectionate and was ever ready to entertain his friends with stories of the war. He was loved and esteemed by all who knew him and his loss will be universally felt.

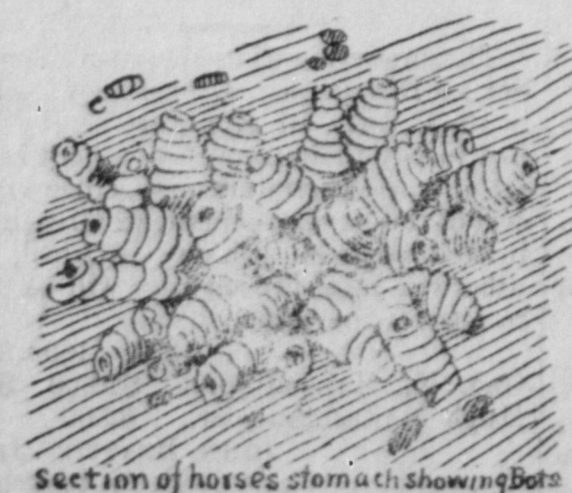
