

A New Coin Needed.

The Canadian Trade Review of Montreal suggests the advisability of supplementing our list of coins with a new one of the value of 121 cents. There are thousands of transactions daily, says our contemporary, which call for twelve and a half cents or 371, and so on being paid, and it is impossible to pay this sum by any coins we use. Half yards, hall pounds, or half pecks of any goods which are twenty-five cents a yard, pound or peck cannot be bought at the price fixed. I'he universal custom is to charge thirteen cents for half of any article at twenty-five cents. Now half a cent is not a large sun to most purchasers, but to many it is an item they ought to be protected from wasting, for surely it is waste to sacrifice money solely because there is no coin to represent the payment we wish to make. 
