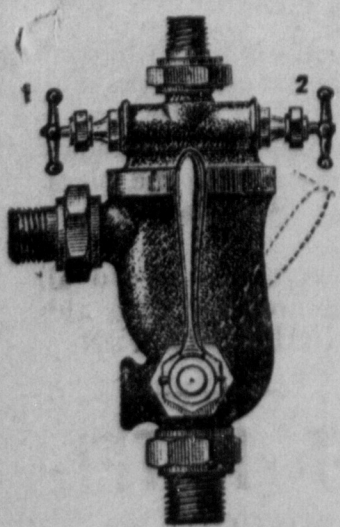

### A New Coin Needed.

The Canadian Trade Review of Mont-  
real suggests the advisability of supple-  
menting our list of coins with a new one  
of the value of 12½ cents. There are  
thousands of transactions daily, says our  
contemporary, which call for twelve and a  
half cents or 37½, and so on being paid,  
and it is impossible to pay this sum by  
any coins we use. Half yards, half  
pounds, or half pecks of any goods which  
are twenty-five cents a yard, pound or  
peck cannot be bought at the price fixed.  
The universal custom is to charge thirteen  
cents for half of any article at twenty-five  
cents. Now half a cent is not a large sum  
to most purchasers, but to many it is an  
item they ought to be protected from  
wasting, for surely it is waste to sacrifice  
money solely because there is no coin to  
represent the payment we wish to make.  
In the course of a year these half cents  
amount to a sum worth saving.

### THE WIDE WIDE WORLD.

LONDON, March 12.—A despatch to the  
Daily News from Berlin says that agents  
of the Spanish government have arrived  
at Oberndorf, Wurtemberg, to receive  
30,000 Mauser rifles for use in the Span-  
ish army.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Speeches  
were listened to to-day by the House  
Judiciary Committee from the large dele-  
gations of Clergymen and others who  
advocate and antagonize the bill to place  
the name of God in the constitution of  
the U. S.

NEW YORK, March 12.—The Herald  
has a cable from St. Petersburg which says  
that 200 fishermen belonging to Revel,  
with their horses and carts have been  
blown out to sea on a piece of floating  
ice. They had only one day's provisions  
with them and they have been missing  
five days.

AMHERST, N. S., March 13.—The lock-  
out at Joggins mines resulted in a regular  
riot yesterday morning, in which a dozen  
men were severely injured and had to  
have their wounds dressed. One man  
was injured seriously. The management  
notified the married men that they could  
go to work yesterday, but that No. 2 slope  
would not be worked. This arrangement  
was not satisfactory to the unmarried  
men and yesterday, those men debarred  
from going to work went out and waylaid  
those going to work, beating them, knock-  
ing them down and cutting them quite  
badly. Work is said to be off indefinitely.

LONDON, March 12.—The permanent  
under-secretary of state for foreign affairs  
says Thomas Henry Anderson was asked  
to-day if the report cabled here from the  
United States that a settlement of the  
Venezuelan question had been reached  
was correct. He said that he would be  
glad to know that the dispute was settled,  
but he added: "I know nothing about  
such a settlement, as the one referred to in  
New York, having been reached. For all  
I know, however, a settlement may be  
near but I have not heard of its attain-  
ment."

A later despatch says: "It can be stat-  
ed positively notwithstanding publica-  
tions to the contrary that no settlement  
has been reached for the Venezuela bound-  
ary question, but according to the best  
authority matters are shaping themselves  
in such a fashion as to warrant the belief  
that there will be a satisfactory outcome."

OTTAWA, March 13.—At a meeting of  
executive of Knights of Labor and other  
prominent laborers, it was decided to  
form a Canadian Federation of labor hav-  
ing no connection with the United States  
labor organizations and to organize at  
once. Canadians believe there is no long-  
er anything to be gained by their con-  
nection with international associations  
since the alien law, as enforced by the  
United States prevents a Canadian mem-  
ber of affiliated bodies from obtaining  
employment in the States.

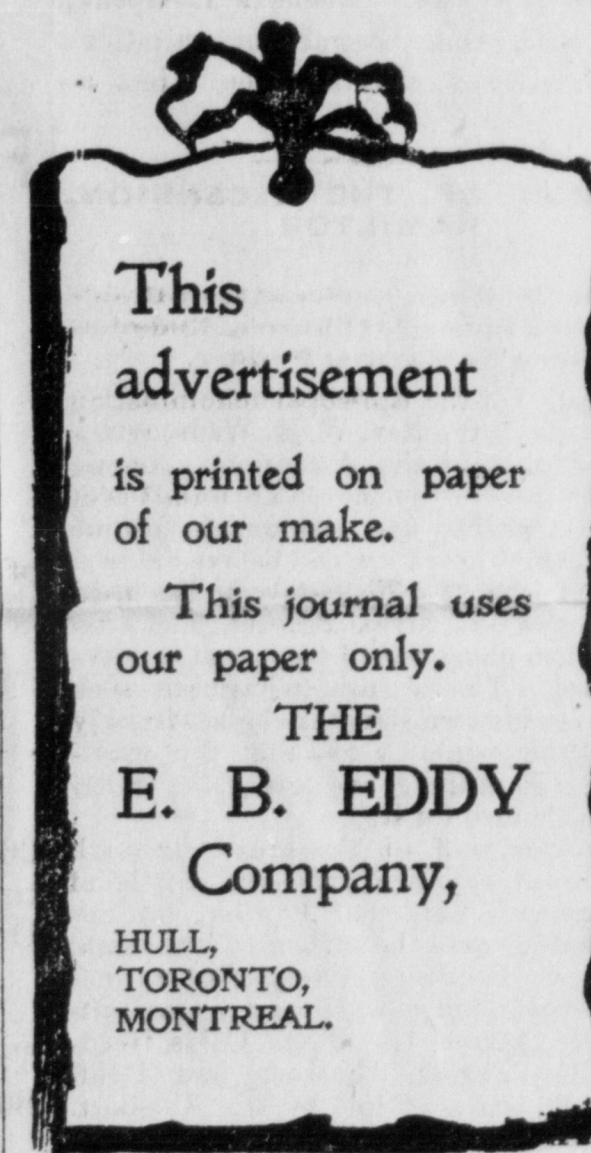
