The Crisis.

To but few men are given the gratification of seeing the evolution of national life which we call History, develop itself so rapidly that we can note its process and be conscious of its progress and effects. To still a less number comes the glory, or shame, of making History, and of leaving, for weal or woe, their impress "on the sands of time," and of claiming a share in the wonderful work of building up a nation. Both of these processes have been shared during the last few weeks by the men now in attendance at our Dominion Parliament.

a clear sky. It was not so to those who were watching the course of events, in fact, the news that only seven had resigned was a positive relief. It was supposed that either the Premier would resign or else that all the other ministers would do

No pains were taken by the revolting Conservatives in Quebec who gave to the Liberals, Montreal Centre and Jacques Cartier, to conceal the fact that their kick was not against the party but against its recognized leader. Their action also in practically forbidding any leading man of their number from entering the Cabinet under Bowell, was conclusive as to their positions. It was quite evident that while the Remedial Bill might appeal to a certain amount of sentiment in Quebec. that more material reasons were swaying public opinion there. It was well known also that the Premier had given serious offence to his party in the West by his cavalier treatment of their claims in regard to the Hudson Bay Route, and it was well known that the Conservatives had no chance of carrying a single seat for Bowell west of Lake Superior. These facts being well known to the Ministers, will go a great way in explaining, and also in excusing their somewhat precipitate action in resigning.

During the long and intensely exciting time, during which the crisis lasted, one could not help admiring the cool, selfpossessed and dignified conduct of the Conservative members of all ranks. Not a foolish boast or a sign of despondency was heard or seen. They stood firmly, but with the utmost kindness and dignity, to the position that in a word, Tupper was the man, and nothing else would satisfy them. That every effort was made to break the solid feeling was well krown, but without avail. Even the position taken by the Gov. General failed to move them. It may have been quite proper for Lord Aberdeen to preserve his own dignity yet it is certain, that his action was a severe blow to the Conservative party, and

BRITAIN AGAINST THE WORLD.

A remarkable feature of the world's affairs recently has been the manner in which the attention of all nations has been that we emerged into other lines of directed toward England. 


