Upon resuming the chair the Warden warmly thanked the council for their expression of kindness and said that he felt proud that the Parish of Acadieville, the newest parish in the county should be thus honored.

Votes of thanks were then tendered the treasurer, Mr. Forbes, for the manner in which he had performed the duties of that office during the last year; to Mr. Caie for the proficient manner in which he had performed the duties of Secy, and Inspector of Licenses; to Mr. Hutchinson, Clerk of the Peace; and to Mr. Grierson, Auditor.

### The Manitoba Elections.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 17.—The final returns from the Provincial elections show the government has carried 30 out of 39 seats, with straight supporters and with good majorities, redeeming six seats formerly held by the opposition. The opposition carried five seats of which three are French and controlled by Catholic influences. The Independents carried two and the Patrons two. Of the candidates elected 35 are pledged to support the national schools, which makes almost a clean sweep for the national schools outside of the French constituencies. Premier Greenway regards the verdict as a wonderful triumph, and says that in view of the result the Federal government will never attempt to coerce Manitoba.

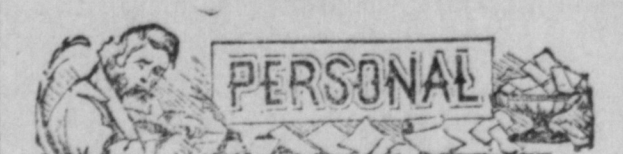

Director General Martinez Campos has decided to retire from the command of the Spanish forces in Cuba and from the direction of the campaign against insurgents. This decision was arrived at after his conference with the representatives of three political parties in Cuba, when he found two of the three unalterably opposed to him and his methods. A despatch from Madrid says the Spanish government has decided to recall from Cuba Campos and his brother-in-law, Gen. Adrius, second in command. Generals Marin and Pando will be temporarily substituted in their places. Supreme command in the island will be conferred on Gen. Weyler.
