Now that the St. John Globe, the Moncton Transcript and sundry other Liberal journals are perspiring with zeal for purely party government in prov incial affairs, it may be observed that for over 30 years this province has given its support to composite administration. So long ago as 1865 when confederation was mooted the Tilley-Fisher government. which had been purely Liberal in the old sense of the term, sought Conservative allies to carry that measure. When they were defeated at the polls the Smith-Anglin government which succeeded, was also of a composite character, so far as the old parties were concerned. And so it has been since confederation. When new lines of cleavage had been formed, growing out of the introduction of federal politics our successive local administrations each included members who, in Canadian some with the other party. Throughout these thirty years, with few if any exceptions, the majority in the New Brunswick house of assembly has been of the Liberal Conservative party, and it is so to-day. It may therefore be doubted whether in having a composite government at Fredericton the Liberal Conservative party has not been the loser rather than the gainer, and whether, from the party standpoint it might not be better to take the Globe and the Transcript. AN OVER CROWDED CIVIL SERVat all at their word, eliminating the liberal element altogether from the government of the day and thus trying the experiment of purely party government. The province, which in federal affairs no doubt been greatest in the departments went two-thirds Liberal in the elections of public works and agriculture, though of 1878, has since swung strongly into the Conservative column. In the elections of 1891, but two Liberals were returned to Ottawa, and in the contest of June last, if we except Dr. Lewis, an old-time Con servative, the Liberal group of counties is confined to the lower part of the St. John river valley-Queens, Kings and St. John. From the lower boundary of Sun bury up river to the Quebec boundary, all the counties went Conservative, as did Charlotte and the entire north shore group from the Missiguash to the Metapedia. With these, or with the so-called gerrymander, the federal franchise bill, the reform of the senate or the reconstruction of the civil service, what has the provincial legislature to do? If it were to attempt to resolve or to legislate upon any of these questions its interference would be resented as an impertinence. Why then should our local parties or politics be divided on federal party lines. We must draw the line somewhere, and if the line is not drawn where for a generation past it has been drawn in this province, we shall probably in the end stop at nothing short of introducing federal politics into our civic and municipal elections, as is done in the United States to the no great advantage of the communiby.

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If election petrions were made purely with a view of punishing corrupt acts and securing a free and uncorrupted expression of the popular will they might be commended. But who knows of a petition honestly based on such grounds? We read that in Ontario the party mana-

gers, having made ready some sixty or seventy retitions swapped them off against each other on the last day that such petitions were admissable. Such traffic is as little defensible as the most corrupt of the elections it was proposed to challenge.

In our own province we have a number

of election protests against members of both parties who had large majorities. These include Hon. Messra. Foster and Costigan, Mr McInerney, Col Domville, Mr. Ellis and others. Probably no one believes that in either of these cases was the entire majority, or any considerable part of it obtained by other than by fair means. The people at large would willingly have accepted the results as declared PARTY GOVERNMENT FOR THE by the returning officers. But the party managers had their own ends to serve. It

so happened that the people had chosen nine or ten Conservatives to four or five Libera's and this gave a chance for obvious | When human reason falters in its gait, advantage to the Liberals in beginning a war of protests. Whether the object be revenge, or unseating, or swapping off, the best chances would rest with the party is a miserab'e game altogether as it is played, and the respectable electorate should frown upon it. The worst elements of blackmail and compounding of felonies underlie the average election protest. Even when a seat corruptly obtained is vacated by the courts it is usually followed by another contest more bitter, more exciting and more corrupt than the

first. The way to pure elections lies not through the election courts, and it is rare indeed that the managers. who set the machinery of the courts in motion, have affairs were connected some with one and cleaner hands than their fellows The best way out in New Brunswick protests is to drop the whole of them without consideration or bargain of any kind, and accept the declared results of the voting. We say this on general principles without any special reference to Kent. We are satisfied that Mr. McInerney's election would in any case be sustained by the courts, lut if otherwise, Kent would return him again by an increased majority.



There is little doubt that the civil service. notably at Ottawa has been for a good while over crowded. The congestion has the interior is another bureau of the same class. In each of these a succession of ministers have taken in and appointed a number of their friends, and have been mercifully careless about removing others whom they found employed, though they were of little use.

When public works of an extensive character were being constructed ; when the census was being compiled, or the rapid and extensive surveys in the Northwest were being pushed, each of the departments named needed a larger staff than before. But the efficiency and security of the civil service should both be regarded. 




