THE WIDE, WIDE WORLD

Miss Kate Wheelock, the well-known whist-teacher, began her successful professional career ten or twelve years ago. At first she taught a class for nothing, but she was soon struck by the idea that she had a money-making occupation at her hand, and began charging a regular fee for her instruction. Even since then she has had all she could do in the way of conduction classes, has travelled from place to place wherever classes have been organized, and has lately introduced an invention in the shape of a stereopticon, by means of which she is able to teach large classes to better advantage.

The Royal Society for the Protection of Animals in Florence describes its work in a readable little pamphlet. The society is making brave efforts toward the relief of helpless creatures, but the report says: "It cannot be denied that Italy is far behind the rest of Europe, Spain excepted, in humane feeling." It makes grateful mention of benefits from American hands, among others, Miss Eddy, of Providence, well known as a friend of animals everywhere.

The Boston University and the Northwestern University at Evanston, Ill., have both taken action to discountenance the use of tobacco by their respective students. Observations made by physicians on students at Yale and Amherst show that the non-users of tobacco surpass the users in both physical development and in scholarship.

A lady who has just returned from Armenia asserts that foreign consuls and missionaries there estimate that fully a million deaths occurred in that country as a result of the massacres and starvation. The present condition of Armenia, she declares, is worse than during the massacres, and thousands of the inhabitants are starving to death.

Some days ago a respectable white woman employed as a domestic in a prominent family in Franklin parish was sent across Texas river on an errand and failed to return. A searching party found her mutilated body in the woods. Suspicion pointed to the white tramp who has been seen near there. Dogs were used and the tramp was run down. He confessed that he had outraged and then murdered the woman. The crowd bound the wretch, staked him to the nearest tree and after burning his body and ridding it with bullets quietly dispersed.

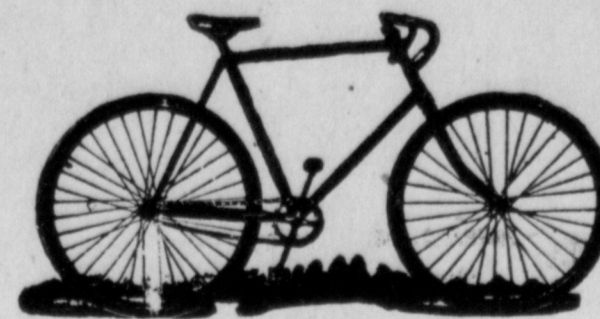
