



STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.—During the thunder and lightning on Thursday last, the St. Aloysius R. C. church was struck by lightning. The spire was badly splintered and some of the floor torn up. It is thought that a part of the spire will have to be taken down and rebuilt. The full extent of the damage is not yet known. The church is insured in the Lancashire, against lightning.

BURIED AT BOSTON.—The funeral of the late Edwin J. Wetmore, took place Saturday afternoon from the residence of his son, Mr. S. A. Wetmore, Bowdoin terrace, Dorchester. Rev. Edward L. Atkinson, of the Ascension, read the simple service of the Episcopal church. The Verdi quartet sang "Still Still with Thee," "Lead, Kindly Light," and "Nearer My God, to Thee." There was no eulogy, but among the large number present, including relatives from St. John, N. B., were those who had met the deceased during his brief sojourn in Boston and who left in the reference of the rector to the great bereavement of the family a realization of the sterling character of one who had been a power for good in the community in which he had lived. Beautiful floral tributes in large numbers were sent from friends far and near. The interment was in the family lot in Forest Hill Cemetery.—Boston Herald.

THE WAR IN CUBA.—Spanish steamship Navarro arrived yesterday from Cienfuegos, Cuba. She reports having spoken barque Aussia, of St. John, N. B., Capt. Anderson, Ship Island for Tyne, in lon. 71.48 and lat. 36.47 N., on June 18, at 8.30 a. m.—all well. Speaking of the war in Cuba, Capt. Egnerola states there is very little fighting going on. The insurgents keep well in the mountains, so that the fight is more like a rabbit hunt than anything else. The Spanish army has a line established through the country, and parts of the troops are operating at each side so as to force the insurgents to fight. The captain thinks if the Spanish troops succeed in surrounding the insurgents the trouble will soon be over. The country is in a bad way, as the insurgents are destroying the sugar plantations and other properties. The rainy seasons now setting in, and more troops are dying from fever than from bullets.—Globe.

IN CHAMBERS.—Before Judge W. W. Wells Saturday morning, the matter of George W. Robertson vs. Alba C. Store came up for argument. This matter was tried at the last term of the Kent County Court and a verdict found for plaintiff for only \$7.00. In this matter a commission was issued to take evidence in New York. This was an application on behalf of the plaintiff, for a new trial on the following grounds:—
1. Improper admission of evidence of commission to take evidence of S. L. Storer;
(a) The commission was not issued pursuant to the terms of the Judge's order therefor and did not contain the clauses and provision directed by such order;
(b) Sufficient and proper notice pursuant to the said order was not given to the plaintiff's commission of the execution thereof and taking evidence thereunder;
(c) The special ground of objection taken on the trial.
New trial granted on usual terms. E. Albert Reilly for plaintiff and R. Barry Smith for defendant.—Transcript.




