Hay Very High.

Hay is getting very scarce. A gentleman who has just returned from Caledon County, says he never saw it so scarce there. He had the greatest difficulty to get two cars, most all of the dealers being completely sold out, and the farmers having only enough for their own use. It is retailing here now at \$14 per ton and dealers expect that it will go as high as \$20 per ton before the season is out. The outlook for an average hay yield in any of the countries is very poor. In Carleton it is very thin and the prospects are that the yield will fall considerably below that of last year. Oats there look fairly well, and will be up to the average, providing there is a fair amount of rain. In Victoria County the hay crop is very poor also, but in Madawaska it looks rather better. Although the cut last year was rather lighter than usual, there was stock enough left from the previous year to fully supply the demand and thus keep the price down. But such is not the case this season, and the price will probably go up very high.—Gleaner.
