JOHN ROSS KILLED.—John Ross, aged 16 years, son of Mr. Daniel Ross was killed at Chatham Station Thursday forenoon. He was employed on the Canada Eastern Railway and was on the train when it returned from the pulp mill. He fell and was run over and killed while attempting to unloose the car from the engine. His body was severed in two by the wheels of the engine. Death was almost instantaneous. Coroner Dr. John S. Benson went out and viewed the remains. There will be no inquest. The whole community was shocked to hear of the sad fatality and the deepest sympathy is expressed for his bereaved friends.—Liberal Herald.

REV FATHER MORRISSEY WELCOMED HOME.—On Thursday, 16th instant, after evening service at St. Andrew's Chapel, Loggieville, N. B., several members of the congregation of that church, called upon their pastor, the Rev. Wm. Morrissey, and presenting him with an address of welcome, congratulating him on his safe return from Europe where he has spent the last few months. The address was accompanied by a purse of money. After the presentation, the rev. gentleman was invited to the chapel reception room, which was very tastefully decorated with evergreens—several of which encircled words of welcome—to join a large number of both the old and the young of the congregation, at a sociable tea party got up in his honor. On the previous Sunday, the day of his return, the congregation of St. Peter's, Baribogue, also presented Father Morrissey with an address of welcome and a purse of money.

DESTROYED BY FIRE.—About one o'clock Saturday morning fire was discovered in the residence of Capt. George Long, Queen St. The family had retired and Mrs. Long was awakened by the falling of a brick from the chimney. The alarm was given as soon as possible and as everybody was asleep at the time it was some time before a crowd could be got together to work the fire engine. The building was practically demolished before the alarm was given. But as soon as people could gather, everybody did their utmost to quell the flames and save what furniture they could. Moody, a young member of the family had to jump from an upper story in order to save himself. The house and all the out-buildings were totally destroyed. There was a large quantity of firewood and coal and a lot of vessels gear destroyed. A part of the furniture was saved. It was with the utmost difficulty that Mr. Forbes' residence on one side and Mr. Stevenson's on the other were saved. The building was insured for \$800 which would partially cover the loss.

THE WIDE, WIDE WORLD.

A London costermonger was strangled by his shirt collar while asleep the other day.

The Czarine of Russia has recently ordered a typewriter with gold type bars and the frame inlaid with pearls.

An impi of friendly natives has defeated a force of Matabele insurgents at the Naziane river with great slaughter.

The Turks in Canea are marking the shops of Christians with a cross, and it is feared that a general massacre is in contemplation.

A duel was fought near Berlin last week between two army officers. Pistols were used, and one of the combatants was instantly killed.

It is stated in Madrid that the Government has decided to send one hundred thousand additional troops to Cuba by the end of the present year.

The House of Commons, by a vote of 232 to 75, has passed to its third reading the Diseases of Animals bill, which excludes the importation of live cattle from Canada.

The marriage of Mr. Rankin Dawson, son of Sir William and Lady Dawson, of Montreal, to Miss Coates, niece of Sir Peter Coates, of Paisley, was celebrated in London yesterday.

It was learned yesterday that the London General Omnibus Company has contracted for five thousand Canadian horses, for which they will pay an average of forty pounds a head.

Another British Columbia mining company, the Pioneer Development and Exploration Company, issued its prospectus yesterday, which places the capital at one hundred and fifty thousand pounds.

It was announced in London last night that the British Foreign Office is expected to take decided action in regard to the arrest of Mr. Harrison, the crown surveyor or British Guiana, by the Venezuelans.

Sir Joseph Prestwick, professor of geology at Oxford, and formerly president of the Geological Society, and the author of many valuable works on geology is dead. He was eighty-four years of age.

The observatory on Mont Blanc is now complete, with the exception of one large telescope, which cannot be taken up the mountain until the snow is less deep. Regular work will, therefore, be begun this summer.

At the recent Parliamentary election in Frome, England, the agent of the Liberal party predicted the vote to be:—Mr. Barlow, 5,064; Lord A. Thynne, 4,810. The actual vote was:—Mr. Barlow, 5,062; Lord A. Thynne, 4,763.

Professor Falb, of Vienna, announces that the earth will collide with a comet on November 13th, 1899. The earth itself will survive the shock, but every living thing will be choked with poisonous gases, and be finally cremated.

Extraordinary rumours are afloat concerning Captain Dreyfus. That of his escape is strenuously denied, and it is alleged that he asked the authorities at Noumea to transmit a memoir which contains important revelations to the President of the Republic. The fact that on the morning of his degradation the prisoner declared, as he passed the officers present, that everything would be explained in three years, may have something to do with the present document.

United States and Spain.

LONDON, June 23.—The Standard publishes a despatch from Madrid saying the government is still uninformed officially of the report which Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, American consul general at Havana, has made to his government anent the situation in Cuba. If the tenor of the report is as stated in unofficial despatches received in Madrid it will make Gen. Lee's stay in Havana difficult. The despatch adds that the senate yesterday debated the questions of relations between Spain and the United States. Prof. Comas demanded that the protocol of 1877 with the United States be denounced. The speech of Prof. Comas was loudly applauded.

Killed in a Railway Accident

SPOKEN FALL, Wash., June 23.—A report is in circulation here that a west bound train on the Great Northern road struck a slide about Kootenay Falls, Idaho, and 12 cars were carried from the track into the river. Some of the cars floated. On one of the latter, according to the story, were 12 tramps who had been stealing a ride. One of them managed to reach the top of the cars and cried for help. The people on shore tried to throw a rope to him, but failed, and the car and contents were swept over the falls.

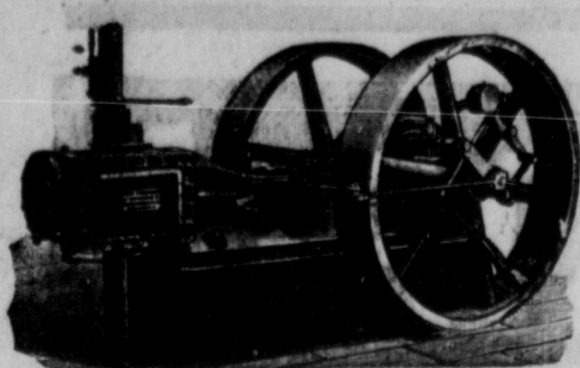
