United States and Spain.

LONDON, June, 23 .- The Standard publishes a despatch from Madrid saying the government is still uninformed officially of the report which Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, American consul general at Havana, has made to his government anent the situation in Cuba. If the tenor of the report is as stated in unofficial despatches received in Madrid it will make Gen. Lee's stay in Havana difficult. The despatch adds that the senate yesterday debated the questions of relations between Spain and the United States. Prof. Comas demanded that the protocol of 1877 with the United States be denounced. The speech of Prof. Comas was loudly applauded.






