

# Cramp in The Leg.

Many persons of both sexes are troubled with cramp in one or both of the legs. It usually comes on suddenly and while it lasts the pain is acute. Most people jump out of bed-the cramp nearly always comes on just after going to bed or while undressing-and either rub their leg or get some one to do it for them. There is nothing easier than to overcome the spasm and the method suggested is as follows : Provide a good strong cord-a long garter will do if nothing else is handy. When the cramp comes on take the cord, wind it around the leg over the place in which the pain is felt, and take one end in each hand and give it a sharp pull, one that will hurt a little. The cramp will cease instantly, and the sufferer can go to bed assured that it will not come again that night .- Phila delphia Record.
