

## The Friend of England.

The address of Senator Walcott in the United States Senate against the new Monroe doctrine was a powerful effort and it is believed will have considerable effect in stimulating and strengthening the opposition to the measure and may lead to its being pigeon holed. In the course of his address Senator Walcott said:

In the early years of the century there seemed promise of the same advancement in civilization in South as in North America. That hope was long since dispelled. Instead of developing into self-respecting republics, the nations of South America have shown themselves so far to be, almost without exception, utterly unfitted for selfgovernment. Their so called republics are largely and usually military despotisms based on force and relying on blood shedding and assassination for their establishment and their brief continuance. The people are ignorant and submissive, the rulers arbitrary and cruel. The fact is that we have nothing in common with these countries.

Much of the present friction between Great Britain and Venezuela arises because of the recent development of gold fields in Southern Venezuela. Where the vexed boundary line will finally be located we cannot tell, but I sincerely hope it will rightfully be found to place these rich mines where the English speaking people who develop them will not be subject to the cupidity of the half-breeds of Venezuela, and where English common law and the certainty of its enforcement will throw over them shelter and protection.

France is a sister republic, and although most of her colonies commended in the resolution of the Senator from Alabama have fewer rights than Cuba, she is yet entitled to our consideration and sympathy because of her form of government; Germany has furnished us with hundreds of thousands of worthy citizens who are a credit to the republic; Russia was our friendly ally in the late war. And yet, Mr. President, when I read that all those governments, France, Germany and Russia had allied themselves together against Great Britain, and that the people of those little islands, "compassed by the inviolate sea," in defence of what they deemed their rights were marshalling their armies and assembling their navies, ready undaunted to face a whole world in arms, unyielding and unafraid, I thank God I was of that race. (Great applause.)

Whatever of advancement and of progress for the human race the centuries shall bring us, must largely come, in my opinion, through the spread of the religion of Christ and the dominance of the English speaking people, and wherever you find both, you find communities where freedom exists and law is obeyed. (Applause.) Blood is thicker than water, and until some quarrel divides us, which heaven forbid, may these two great nations of the same speech and lineage and traditions, stand as brothers, shoulder to shoulder, in the interest of humanity, by their union compelling peace and awaiting the coming of the day when nation shall not lift sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more.

## Rat Plague in Southern Russia.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Mice and rats have caused great destruction in certain localities of Southern Russia during the past two years, and the remarkable invasion of the rodents is the subject of a report just received at the State Department from Mr. Thomas E. Hoeman, United States consul at Odessa. The first appearance of mice in great numbers was in the autumn of 1893 and their rapid increase is attributed to two consecutive good harvests, in consequence of which much grain remained in stacks until threshed and to the mildness of the weather. There were three varieties of mice observed, the common house mouse, the common field mouse and another kind never previously noticed. Every effort was made to stop the plague and finally the government aid was secured? The Department of Agriculture in June, 1894, sent Dr. Meretzhmovski to one of the provinces infested to conduct experiments of destruction to the mice and rats by the cultivating of bacillus discovered by him. The results were excellent. Epidemic disease was generated among the rodents and now the plague has ended.

## Grand Falls, N. B.

JAN. 15.—THE REVIEW comes to me regularly. During my leisure time, especially on Saturdays, my pipe and THE REVIEW are my two best friends. The former affords me satisfaction in my loneliness and the latter interests me by the happenings of every important corner of my native county.

At the date of writing, the ground in this part of the province is almost bare. The heavy rains which fell between Christmas and New Year's has left us completely out of snow to the great dissatisfaction of our citizens, specially the lumbermen. That the climate here is more severe than in the southern counties is, it seems to me, indisputable.

On the eve of New Year's a hurricane passed through here from North West. It caused much damage to property on its way. In this town six buildings were demolished.

The heavy frost which we had lately has frozen the St. John river. Last Sunday a number of sportsmen were near the Six-mile Island with their trotters. A great many had assembled to witness the sport. The bridge of ice has put an end to the ferry-boats for the season. These ferries are, in summer, the only communication with Maine, and are situated at every 8 miles along the river. On this account much smuggling is done.

An act to incorporate this town will be a question of the Legislature during the next session. If it is incorporated, as we are assured it will be, an American firm will begin soon after the construction of a saw-mill and a paper-mill, which will greatly add to its commercial importance and prosperity. The paper-mill will find in the vicinity enough spruce-wood for many years.

Grand Falls has three churches, the principal of them being the Roman Catholic, the costliest building of the town, two doctors, one lawyer, three hotels and several commercial buildings such as stores, shops, etc.

The custom at New Year's is to shake hands between friends and kiss and exchange wishes. Some also invite their friends to a supper, after which they have a party of cards—their favourite play being "la pie." Young folks participate in a dance. Their chief mode of dances are Cotillions, Galops, Quadrilles, old French-Canadian style of dances.

In every corner of the Globe you find men addicted to drinking. As to the opinion which I have formed of these places, they are on a general point of view more temperate than French villages of Kent Co. In public meetings the bottle is called into play in the sight of all, and every person present is invited to take a share. Women and girls take a glass of Rye whiskey as I would a glass of fresh water. In villages here, there are three or four private houses where liquor is sold secretly.
