tant Decision by the Supreme Court at Ollaws Monday.

OTTAWA, Oct. 14 .- The supreme court gave j.dgmcnt yesterday in the case respecting provincial fisheries. The opinions are entirely in favor of the provinces.

The title to the beds of all waters, except public harbors, is in the respective provinces.

The revised statutes of Canada, chapter 92, is held intra vires The province may grant land extending into lake or navigable water for building wharf, etc., and the grantee can build thereon, but cannot grant any part of the bed of a public harbor.

Riparian proprietors before confederation had the exclusive right of fishing in non navigable waters, the beds of which had been granted by the crown. The Dominion parliameni cannot authorize the giving of the right to fish in non-navigable waters, nor make laws to lease or licerse right to fish in any waters, the beds of which are assigned to provinces under the B. N. A. act.

Revised statutes of Canada, chapter 95, is held ultra vires so far as it attempts to confer exclusive rights to fish in provinteial waters. The dominion can only pas general laws for regulation, etc., of fisheries.

Revised Statutes Ontario, chap. 24, sec 47 and secs 4 to 13, 19 and 21 of the Ontario Acts of 1892 are held intra vires.

Revised Statutes Quebec, secs 1 375 to | 1,378 are held intra vires, A province can legislate as to fishways in dams, etc., and to regulate and protect fisheries within the province, subject to dominion laws.

Two Persons Lurned to Dath Near Gagetown.

GAGETOWN. Oct. 15 .- A serious fire, which had fatal results, occurred early yesterday morning at a place known as Swan Creek. about two miles above Upper Gagetown, on the river road. The fire occurred on Mr. Harry A. Estabrooks' farm, and caught in the hog house. A heavy gale of wind was blowing at the time and in a few minutes that building with its contents, including some eight fine hogs, was consumed. The fire then spread to the woodshed, and from the latter place it caught the dwelling house. The inmates of the house were all asleep and knew nothing of the fire until the groans of a colored servant named Wright awakened Mr. Estabrooks, who found the house all on fire. Mr. Estabrooks awakened his wife and they with their two daught. ers and a son escaped in their night clothes. Miss Simpson, a young lady who is teaching the school at Upper Gagetown, was boarding at Mr. Estabrooks' house, and when she became aware that the house was on fire, she rushed into the main hall and was met by the flames. Her escape was made by jumping from her bedroom window to the ground.

A young girl named Appleby, who was employed as a domestic, was unable to get out of the house and was burned to death. It is supposed that she had been overcome by the smoke and never left her room but perished there. The servant Wright had staggered down the stairs to the lower floor where he had fallen, and his dying Mr. C. McLean is busily engaged erect. groans, which awakened Mr. Estabrooks, found in the ruins late yesterday morning but Miss Appleby's remains were not found until some hours later. A large fire had been made in the hog-house on Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of builing food for the hogs, and the fire is supposed to have caught in this way. Mr. Estabrooks lost \$175 in cash and a valuable gold watch. It was only a short while from the time the fire first caught until the three buildings were in ruins. A large crowd of the neighbors were soon on the scene, and managed to save the barn which is situated some distance from the other buildings. Mr. Estabrooks, who works on his farm in the summer and works in the woods during the winter, had for his home a very substantial one and a half story house, well furnished. He had 125 harrels of potatoes in the cellar, and loses them all. His property was insured for \$1,200. The coroner did not consider an inquest necessary.






Tynan Released

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
