DURATION OF LIFE.

IT DEPENDS LARGELY UPON INDI-VIDUAL ACTION.

This is the Conclusion of Students of Longevity-Rapidity of Life Induces a Shortening of Existence-One Hundred Years Should be the Term of a Man's Stay Upon Earth.

It is natural for man to cling to this sphere of existence. and the universal desire is for a prolongation of life. When Rip Van Winkle said, "May you live long and be happy," he epitomized the object of life. From the days of the old alchemist to the Spanish navigator down to the present time man has ever been endeavoring to discover the elixir of life or has sought the fabled fountain of eternal youth, and the great problem, "What is the secret of longevity?" is still unanswered and only partially solved.

According to statistics annually one person in every 19,974 in the United States takes his own life. This is true as to deliberate suicide. Prof. Grindon affirms that nearly all mankind actually, but through ignorance and unconsciously, commit suicide. He says:

"We do not die; we kill ourselves." When we consider the irregular habits of the human race, the intemperance, the gluttony, the indulgence in animal passions, the fret and worry, the waste of physical and mental powers, the useless expenditure of vital forces, Prof. Grindon states an actual fact. We do kill our-

Every species in the vegetable and animal kingdom has a term of life exclusively its own-a fixed period of years. Individual plants, trees, rep tiles, animals and men may die at all ages of their existence, but of the species, as collective life, each has a term of years decreed it by the nature of its organization.

Those species in the vegetable and animal kingdom which take the most time in developing their organization and are the longest in arriving at maturity are endowed with long life. Early maturity means early death, either in vegetable or animal life.

It is because trees live so slowly that they endure for centuries, and because animals live so fast that few of them reach fifty years. All of the longeval animals have a relatively lower vital energy; all of the short lived (or at least such as attain any considerable bulk) possess it in excess. As a result of this condition we usually find the longeval creatures deliberate and stately in their movements and leading calm and placid lives, like the elephant and the swan, while the short lived ones are as remarkable for their sportive restlessness, as they course about the fields or sail through the sky or water. Creatures that run much are rarely if ever long lived. In the longeval tree is tranquil and august; the gourd, that dies with the close of

summer, is rampant and wanton." Man has been endowed with a sufficient supply of vital forces, or resources from which to draw upon, to enable him to live to a good old age. He is free to use them as he will. He is independent and unrestricted, and can act with the same liberty as if he had \$10,000 standing to his credit in the JOHN TRAINOR Kingston | bank. That common expression, "he is living fast," when referring to a person on his downward career, states both a moral and physiological truth.

Out of 1,049 men, 382 had never been sick since childhood, and out of 880 women, 286 had never been sick. The men were bony and muscular and the women plump. While these people were cleanly they were not much given to bathing, and were not informed upon sanitary matters. Only a few of these old people were employes. From this evidence one writer has drawn this conclusion: "Either that a man with the element of long life within him is more independent in nature or that a spirit of independence fostered for years tends to prolong existence. It needs no collection of statistics to prove that in most cases, one who works for a long period for another has a weaker individuality than he who is an emplover."

The above statement is true. Independence and individuality are necessary to long life. I mean by individuality the development of those natural powers or abilities which are peculiar to each organization. The men who are employed in large manufacturing institutions year after year, have their independence constantly suppressed, and with no chance for the development of their individuality, they become mere human machines.

It is evident from the foregoing facts that these old people conserved their vital forces, were regular in their habits, abstained from intoxicating liquor, had good food, clothed themselves comfortably. had much outdoor exercise, and led an independent life. An injury to health and consequent-

ly a shortening of life, is the turning of night into day. The sun is the life-giving force of the universe. The day is the time for work and exercise; the night the time for rest and growth. Any attempt to reverse this order will disastrous to health, The night is the time nature utilizes for growth. Plants grow much more in the night The same fact is true of animal life. Children grow more rapidly in the night-time. The night's sleep recuperates the powers and energy of the adult. Plants and animals must have the alternate of night and day. It was observed by a gentleman who had a pear tree in his yard under an allnight electric light, that the tree, which had borne fruit prolifically before, ceased to bear fruit when subjected all night to the artificial light. The continuous light killed the tree as a fruit bearer. It was necessary for the alternate of darkness to insure the

blossom and fruit. Outdoor life is also a requisite to longevity, Exercising in a gymnasium will not take the place of open-air life. The old people mentioned above were much given to walking along the roadsides and the streams.

In Genesis, vi. chapter, 3d verse, we read: "The days of man shall be an hundred and twenty years." David sings: "The days of your years are three score and ten." Buffon, the naturalist, and Flourens, the physiologist, both expressed the belief that man should live to be 100 years old. Prof. Hufeland, William Kinnear and Dr. Wm. A. Hammond, ex-surgeongeneral of the United States, all affirm that the prolongation of life to 200 years is no dream and that man should live to that age. All authors upon that subject agree that man should live to be 100 years old.

No law of nature clips the thread of existence at three score and ten. Vital statistics show that among the higher races the average of human life has nearly doubled in 200 years. The causes that have operated so far to increase our years are still operative and are multiplying their power. The grosser races are falling under the influences of sanitary laws. 


