FIRE AT NEWCASTLE. -Fire broke out in D & J Ritchie's mill Newcastle about 11 o'clock Friday night. The fire was discovered by the watchman about one of the gangs in the mill. He immediately gave the alarm, but within a very few minutes the whole mill was ablaze. The town turned out and did what they could to save the property and most of the lumber on the wharf was saved. Two vessels. loading at the wharf, the Valona, belonging to We firm; and the Svea, a Norwegian barque, were towed to safe anchorage by the steamer Rustler, Capt. Russell. The Valona is badly damaged. The two vessels had on board about \$20,000 worth of lumber. The mill and all the machinery was destroyed and considerable damage was done to the wharf. The total loss is between \$40,000 and \$50,000; insurance, \$12,000. The companies insured in are the Merhool & London & Globe, Hartford, Lancashire, Æ na, Imperial, and Union. The fire throws out of employment about 400 men.

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
