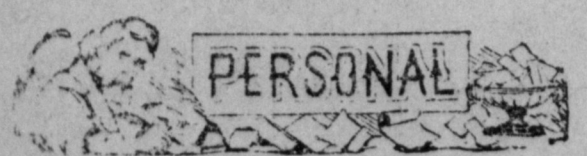

ST. LAWRENCE LUMBER COMPANY'S AFFAIRS.—Messrs. Richard Turner, of Quebec, and W. H. Thorne, of St. John, liquidators of the St. Lawrence Lumber Company, have completed their duties and have received their discharge from Judge Tuck. The St. Lawrence Lumber Company went into liquidation about two years ago. At the time it looked as if there would be serious legal difficulties, as there were conflicting interests in this province, Quebec and England. The liquidators were able to avoid trouble, and it is understood only about \$1,400 of the estate was required to pay all the legal bills. Operations were carried on the first winter and then the property was sold. In all about \$237,000 passed through the hands of the liquidators. They were compelled to pay in full upwards of \$50,000 preference claims for stumpage to the Dominion, New Brunswick and Quebec governments. The general creditors got fifteen cents on the dollar, a better settlement than was looked for at the time of the failure.

Gebhardt formed one of the crew of the Norwegian barque Calefonia, of Drammen, Norway, that foundered in the Bay of Biscay on October 7th last, on which occasion he was drowned. At the moment of the vessel foundering Gebhardt went after a life belt, but, finding that the carpenter of the vessel, who was a married man, was also looking for the same, he (Gebhardt) gave it up to him, saying, "Take it, carpenter, you have a family. Don't mind me." Gebhardt, not being able to swim, was consequently drowned, while the carpenter, who was from Drammen, Norway, was picked up by the boat of an English vessel near at hand, and was thus saved.
