COYOTES AFTER A BICYCLIST.

A Western Wheelman's Hair-Lifting Experience at Dead of Night.

Teddy Dolson recently had an experience compared to which Tam o' Shanter's famous ride pales into insignificance, says The Cheyenne Leader. Instead of the horse with which Tam was equipped Teddy had a bicycle: in the paces of the witches that pursued and plagued and almost crazed the Scotman the Cheyenne man was followed by hungry coyotes. Tam, too, had taken a generous libation of usquebaugh, while Dolson's only refreshment was a hearty supper. According to his habit, Dolson started out for a bicycle run. He had intended to go a few miles south, then return, but, being unacquainted with the country, lost his way, and in endeavoring to regain his bearings, lost himself entirely. He wheeled on in the direction that Cheyenne seemed to him to be, arriving at 8.30 o'clock at Wheeler's ranch, twenty miles from the city. There he was directed how to get back to town, and started back on the trail. On and on he rode, but in no fixed direction, for in the darkness he had promptly lost his way again on leaving the Wheeler ranch. As he wheeled along in the gloomy night over the untracked prairie, wishing for nothing on earth so much as a comfortable bed, he became suddenly aware of the fact that he was being closely followed.

Behind him was a pack of yelping, howling coyotes, that were close upon him before being noticed. Their intention was so evident that his waning energies were awakened with a thrill. He bent over his wheel and pushed it as fast as he could over hill and valley, but always followed by the coyotes. To add to his misfortunes he broke a pedal in attempting too great speed, and was on the point of giving out and letting the hungry coyotes do their worst when he spied a deserted cabin a short distance away. To this he hastened, and abandoning his bicycle, quickly climbed upon the roof that slanted up from the ground. Even here the coyotes followed him, but a coign of vantage and place of refuge was found on the top of the chimney. All night he remained there, at times driving away his pursuers with fragments of brick, which caused their retreat to a short distance, whence, after a series of lugubrious howls, they would return to the attack. At daylight they departed with a parting salute of angry howls and Dolson climbed down and mounted his bicycle, soon reaching Pierre Station on the Denver Pacific, thirty-eight miles from Cheyenne. He was unable to get breakfast until he reached Cary and arrived here at 8.30 the next morning. The hardest part of the whole night's experience, he said, was the fact that he had two cigars in his pocket and not a match to light them. He was very badly used up by the night's experience.

ELECTRICITY ON THE FARM.

Country Life May be Made Less Laborious by a New Agency.

Part of the growing difficulties occasioned by the desertion of the country and the crowding of the cities will be remedied, perhaps, by six years hence—in that wonderful year 1900, which electricians set as a mile post of human progress—by the crowning of steam's reign, says The New York Press. Machinery is rapidly taking the drudgery out of farm work, is making it more profitable when conducted scientifically and on a large scale, and is causing it to attract the attention of city people who long for the beautiful fields. Only the bodily discomforts of farm work have prevented an exodus from the cities to the country. Already electricity is turning its attention to the long-neglected farm work, and has discovered profitable results to be had by subjecting crops to currents of electricity. It is beginning to simplify the ponderous farm machinery, and as soon as the storage battery has received its finishing touches and can be applied to lighting the farmer's toil and increasing his profits the farmer will be looked upon with envy by the prisoners of city streets and counting-house walls. Those particular effects of electricity upon farm machinery and farm life are, however, visible chiefly in the imagination at present, and are not at all likely to be realized in six years; but one great change may be looked for in the immediate future, and that is the improvement of the farmer's condition by means of good roads and the rapid transit which electricity is almost ready to bring, thus greatly enlarging his market and bringing him higher prices for fresher products, and also bringing him closer to the life and pleasures and stimulating effect of the city. There is to be a wonderful change in farm life in the more thickly settled parts of the country in a very few years, and rapid transit will be largely responsible for it. The cheap transmission of electrical power must bring soon many changes that will be felt in the city household, and perhaps the chief of them will be the abolition of the cook stove as it is known at present. The small electric heater has already begun to take its place and it is almost certain that even in six years coal will be banished from a majority of the kitchens in cities adjacent to water power from which electricity is generated. When heat is wanted for cooking purposes it will be had at a moment's notice by the pressing of a button.

Long Distance Photography

Now that Dr. Miethe, the scientific German photographer, has invented a telescopic camera, long distance photography, that chimera of the "dark-room," seems absolutely assured. The objective of this new photographic wonder consists of a convex lens of considerable length of focus and a concave lens of much shorter range. These glasses are placed a certain distance apart, depending on the difference of the two foci. By the laws of optics, this arrangement projects an inverted image of the object for which it is set a long distance from the further end of the lenses. The apparent size of the object depends, of course, upon the space separating the two lenses, which, again, must be set so as to make the focus perfect. The whole apparatus looks very unlike an adjunct to a photographic gallery, and is said to bear a stronger resemblance to a common telescope than it does to a camera. With this apparatus Professor Miethe and his assistants have taken fine pictures of portions of the coast of Potsdam, Germany, at a distance of nearly three English miles.—St. Louis Republic.

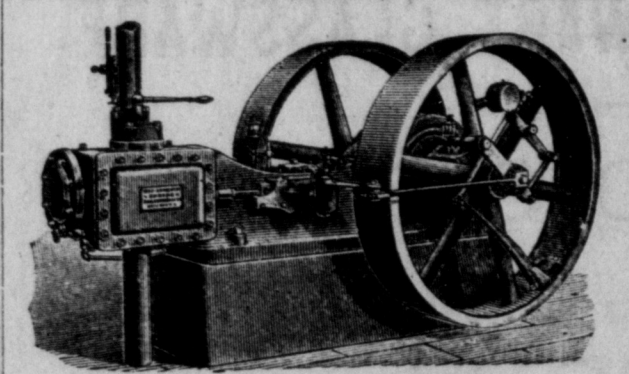
