In the manufacture of wall paper, an industry constantly growing here and abroad, hundreds of thousands of rollers are used for printing the various patterns. For every color in a pattern there is a separate roller. In a single pattern there will be from four to ten or twelve rollers. The average is about seven. These rollers are generally used but one season, and the more inportant, for it has been directly as there are thousands of different patterns inspired from official sources. It is most used each year in the United States and Europe as well as in Canada.

These rollers are made of the very best hard maple, the very kind that Canada produces better than any other country in the world. In the rough they are $19\frac{1}{2}$ or $23\frac{1}{2}$ inches long. The end is 5 or 6 inches square, according to the size of roller required. Only the most perfect wood can be used. It is cut into these sizes. The ends are painted to prevent the wood diying faster with the grain than across it. It is then allowed to stand for three or



VENEZUEDA PROTESTS

Against Secretary Olney's Plan Of S. Itlement.

• BOSTON, Dec. 11 .- A despatch to the Globe from Caracas, Venezuela, via Havti says : Senor Andrade, the Venezuelan Minister to the United States, was to leave yesterday for Washin ton with the cabinet's approval of the Guiana boundary arbitration treaty, but his departure was suddenly stopped. The interpretation put upon this movement is that public opinion has conquered, and that Venezuela will withhold her consent to the arrangement entered into between Secretary Olney and Lord Salisbury, thus nullifying all the work that culminated in this treaty. Comments on the part of the press and public on the negotiations continue to be very bitter. Senor Thomas Michelena, one of the republic's greatest jurists, who was Venezuela's Minister at the Court of St James when Venezuela broke off diplomatic relations with Great Britain on account of the boundary question, published a letter yesterday morning which has created a sensation. It is an open secret that the intense feeling which it has engendered was the cause of Minister Andrade's departure being so abruptly stopped. The president and cabinet had hoped that their formal acceptance of the treaty, subject as the constitution provines to its ratification by Congress, would allay the public's hostility to the document, but to-day's developments have alarmed them. Neither Crespo nor the members of his official family are willing to try any longer to stem the apparently irresistible tide and it is asserted that when Andrade leaves for Washington he will bear nothing more than a diplomatic note to Cleveland saying that the treaty will be duly laid before Congress when it reassembles next February in regular session. Michelena in his letter, discusses the protocol in all its bearings from the standpoint of a jurist and ends by dismissing it as absolutely worthless. He saw first that the adoption of the protocol would invest the United States with the protectorate over this and the other republics of South America, and this move, be thinks, would be dangerous. Next he regards the clause which states that fifty years' occupation shall make a good title as "outrageously inimical to Venezuela's interest, and as " wholly in favor of Eng. land." So vehemently does he denounce this clause that, basing his opinion of the whole on it, he declares that the treaty is "an English trick." "Better lose the territory by force," are Senor Michelena's words, "than acquiesce in the arbitration of the question under the terms of this treaty. We may regain it, if we have to go to y lover it. 




