Northern Notions

When the great Darwin revealed to the men of this generation, his knowledge of God's ways of working, a howl of rage went up from those whose ignorance he exposed. Men who knew nothing of nature and still less of nature's God—whose laws they constantly violated, were boiling over with impotent rage because God had revealed to one, not of the craft, this mode of action in Creation and Providence. Jeers, laughter and scorn greeted the man who dared tell the scribes and pharisees that they knew nothing of what they were given a living for pretending to teach. All this is now changed, and while the sound of Darwin's hammer is still reverberating through the world, and the walls of ignorant bigotry are crumbling before his blows, the good and wise men of all countries and all creeds, are asking in loving reverence, how can these things be. From the venerable and beloved Pontiff of Rome, who presented Dr. Miavt with the Doctor hat for writing a treatise on evolution, and showing how he conceived that it can be harmonized with the traditions of the Roman church, to the venerable Protestant clergyman who is now startling the world by giving it translations of books written in Babylon, ten thousand years before the birth of Christ, all are eagerly asking: What is true—or in other words are repeating Pilate's question to The Great Master, who alone knew "all truth." The answers are coming in from all hands. God is speaking as he never spoke before, because men are listening as they never listened before. The late discoveries in Nipper while it shakes to the foundation long held, and deeply seated prejudices gives us a grander idea of the Great Maker of the universe, than the ignorant and half heathen view so widely held in Christendom up to a few years ago. That there were civilized and powerful nations in the world who wrote books in clay six thousand years before the time of Adam, is a shock to bigotry and priestly ignorance, but a grand triumph for those who seek to know God as he is, and not as ignorant men represent Him.

Well, what has this to do with the great North—It is this—While Darwin said that the traces of our own descent were at times obscure, is it not quite possible that if he had been living in Canada, and particularly in New Brunswick that he might not have thought that the tiger himself was one of our ancestors. Whence comes the lust of destruction. The desire to burn, kill, and drive out all of nature we can find, that so constantly shows itself in uncivilized or semi-civilized man. Here he would find both, in Kent and Northumberland, abundant material to study out an answer. Forests the most magnificent ever made, have been and are still being ruthlessly destroyed, without an effort being made to save them. Fish, whose value no man can guess at, are being exterminated because no one cares enough to apply even the small amount of knowledge we have, to the work of preserving them. Animals of immense economic value are being ruthlessly persecuted out of existence because no man cares for them. When will politics become a science, where professors will recognize their obligation towards God and man, and who will study something more profound than the best way to outwit each other.

Appropos of politics, the young men who are being out of the States and back to Canada, do not evidently, if one can judge by their talk, greatly admire American methods in Government. Rightly or wrongly they one and all hold that American politics are to blame for the terrible state of affairs now existing across the border. What this is one must see and hear men from the Western States tell about it. Bad as was the condition of affairs there some two years ago, when the writer helped to send some thousands of young men back to Canada, they are still worse now.

The threat, "We will back our ballots with our bayonets," then made, are being sternly retracted now. The alternatives now appear to be a financial crash or a civil war. If Bryan be elected the chances for a great financial disaster appear to be of the worst. If McKinley be elected the question at once is asked, will the West and South permit the North to thwart them in a matter on which they have set their heart? The worst feature of the complication is that not only is the sectional hatred between the South and North being revived and strengthened, but that the working men and farmers of the West are being roused against the Gold Bugs of the East whom they accuse of oppressing them. What the outcome will be we cannot yet at all clearly foresee. At no time in its history, however, did foreseeing men regard the outlook with more apprehension. To us who feel nothing of the evils overwhelming these people, their conduct may appear wrong, but to a farmer who borrowed a sum of money at ten per cent. interest when ten bushels of wheat would pay the interest on a hundred dollars, and who now has to sell thirty bushels of wheat to meet this same interest, the case appears somewhat pressing. Anyway, would not the condition of the people of the West and South be better separated from the North? Does a tariff and a currency that suit admirably the North, suit the South and West? Many good and wise men are now inclined to give a different answer than was given by the nation in 1861 to 1865.

A feeling is very largely expressed that we are on the verge of important developments in provincial politics. That there is friction of a very pronounced character between members of the Provincial Government is well known. That an attempt is being made to crowd out Hon. Mr. Tweedie, is no secret. While Tweedie does not even appear to know of what is going on, and some people even assert that he does not, yet he will be found a hard man to dispose of. At all events the duty and interest of Kent is plain. She can only hope for justice in any form by sustaining the present premier in his support of Mr. Tweedie. That the sympathy of our able and respected Mr. Phinney is on this side is generally believed, and the friends of Hon. Mr. Tweedie appear to count on his support. The well known ability, honesty and wide experience of J. D. Phinney will make his opinion weigh heavily with the people of New Brunswick in any case. Money may buy votes and falsehood may excite prejudice, but ability and honesty of purpose can alone inspire confidence and respect. These last are felt for J. D. Phinney in every section and among all shades of opinion in New Brunswick.

The Conservative Convention

At Tuesday afternoon's session of the Conservative Convention at St. John last week, the meeting decided to form a Provincial Association composed of Conservative Senators and members of Parliament, defeated candidates for Parliament, members of the legislature and defeated candidates, presidents of the county associations and one representative for each 3,000 population. The officers to be president, one vice-president for each electoral district (the presidents of the county associations are vice-presidents for the province), a secretary-treasurer and an executive committee composed of one member from each constituency.

Messrs. J. T. Hartr, A. W. Macrae, J. H. Morrison, J. D. Hazen and J. A. Chesley were appointed to prepare a constitution. The provisional officers are: President—Senator Wood. Secretary-treasurer—J. D. Hazen. Executive—Restigouche, Geo. Moffat; Gloucester, T. Blanchard, M. P.; Northumberland, J. Robinson, M. P.; Kent, J. D. Phinney; Westmorland, J. L. Black; Albert, W. B. Jones; Kings, H. M. Campbell; St. John, W. H. Thorne and Dr. Morrison; Charlotte, A. I. Teed; Sunbury and Queens, G. J. Worden; Carleton, J. K. Fleming; York, Walter McFarlane; Victoria, John Costigan. Sir Charles then asked for four delegates to confer with the party leaders—the leader of the opposition, the president of each provincial organization, and Conservative provincial premiers or opposition leaders. Those chosen were Hon. John Costigan, Hon. G. E. Foster, G. V. McInerney, M. P., and G. W. Ganong, M. P.

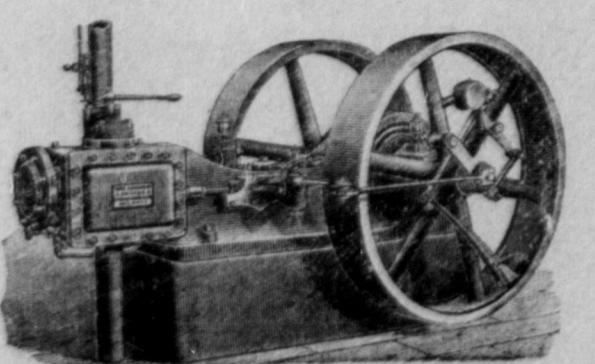
