**The Wreck at Newcastle**  
 The Newcastle Advocate referring to the I. C. R. collision at that place on Monday says: No doubt the accident will be officially investigated, when probably the cause will be ascertained why a special should be allowed to run past the station at a speed of about thirty miles an hour instead of stopping outside the station yard and then shunting off the main track on to a siding. The wreck is the worst one which has ever happened on this section and it is fortunate that no loss of life occurred. The special from North was officiated by conductor Ayer, with driver Taylor and fireman Thompson. As their train dashed by the station and before it had reached the end of the platform both driver and fireman jumped for their lives, the former on the right side where he fell on the adjoining track, cutting his head badly and lying there stunned until picked up by some of the station hands who thought it necessary to telephone for a doctor. The fireman when he jumped struck the platform and although rolled over and over by the momentum was not hurt.

Special freight train with locomotive No. 205, Conductor Lamkie, Driver Smallwood, was waiting for the line to be clear to proceed North, and in view of being ready the points were open on to the main line and Driver Smallwood was in the office at the station getting his orders when the special from North dashed by, and the points being open took the side track to the freight shed where the waiting train was standing.

The fireman was on the train waiting on the siding, he saw the disaster impending, jumped from the cab of the engine and ran down the embankment away from the colliding trains just as the shock came and was closely followed by the box cars as they climbed over the engine and tender and crashed down to the bottom of the embankment, the fleeing fireman being only about a foot ahead of the foremost car when it stopped. The train on the siding was considerably damaged, the trucks under the tender being driven forward. One car had its end knocked out and the contents of the cars were considerably knocked about. Three cars, loaded with sugar in barrels going North, were badly broken up and draw bars broken. A portion of the sugar will have to be re-coopered and the whole transferred.

As the collision occurred the tender was turned end for end down the embankment and alongside the locomotive which was lifted sideways off the rails to a distance of about half the width of the track; the cars, the first, No. 9225, empty, ran over the engine and tender, dropping its trucks in front of the latter and reached the bottom a complete wreck; the next car No. 9523 followed the first, also dropping its trucks with the first one's. Car No. 2043, loaded with bales of hops, had left its trucks with the others, while car No. 1676 loaded with doors and mouldings billed for England, remained perched some nine feet above the track, resting partly on the rear end of the locomotive, the tender and the pile of trucks. This car was also very much broken up although the contents, apparently being packed solidly, were not injured so far as could be seen as the work of transferring its contents to another car was going on. A car of way freight was completely broken to pieces. Its contents were of a miscellaneous character. A piano and organ, both destroyed, dry goods, cigars, etc., for a while strewn the track until gathered up and placed in a place of safety.

About two weeks ago Kaiser had his wife's life insured for \$3,000.

**John L Sullivan May Lose an Arm**  
 Boston, Oct. 28.—John L. Sullivan's arm is in danger of amputation. The hand which enabled him to hold the championship of the world for twelve years, that laid prostrate many a foe, that has brought him fortunes in money, and was the mainstay of his career, has been attacked by a cancer. The cancer itself has been cut by Dr. Galvin of the Emergency Hospital, but the danger is still imminent. Sullivan has been warned that if he does not stop drinking liquor, or if he commits any serious breach of instructions, the whole right arm may have to come off. The "big fellow" is thoroughly frightened and is doing what he is ordered without question.

**Terrible Straits of the Labrador Fishermen**

St. John's, Nfld., Oct. 28.—Dr. Grenfell, superintendent of the British mission to the deep sea fishermen operating in Labrador, sends appalling accounts of the destitution which prevails on that coast owing to the failure of fishery. Hundreds of persons are on the verge of starvation, living only upon flour, which Dr. Grenfell and others are able to deal out to them. A great many must perish within a couple of months unless the government sends prompt relief. This is likely to be done, though it will tax the government's resources to the fullest capacity. The government has started relief works at St. John's to assist the unemployed.


