





A Thrilling Tale of the Sea. Among the passengers of the steamer Gate City, which arrived in Boston Saturday from Savannah were Captain A! bion P. Smith, his daughter Edith L aged 15 years, and six seamen of the wrecked schooner Lelia Smith, of Maine Capt, Smith says the schooner left Wash. ington Sept. 26 with a cargo of lumber for Beverley, Mass. On October 10 the wind increased to a hurricane. The ves sel was found to be leaking and the water rose rapidly in the hold. At 2 p. m. on the 11th the lashings holding the deck load were cut to ease the vessel, but part of the deckload was swept back on board and the remainder was dashed against the schooner. At 8 p. m. the schooner was full of water and standing on her beam ends. The cargo in the hold kept the vessel affoat. All the provisions, fresh water, Lautical instruments and personal effects of everyone on board were swept into the sea. I lashed my daughter to the quarter rail, she being clothed only in a thin skirt. The weather was bitterly cold and the waves repeatedly drenched her to the skin. The crew and myself lashed ourselves to the same rail and for the next 36 hours -uffered great hardships, being without food or water. We expected the vessel would capsize and had given up all hope of rescue when the steamer Gate City hove to near us and sent a boat to us through waves mountains high. The work of rescue was attended with the utmost difficulty; the life savers had all they could

Holes; in the Sails for Speed.

The statement of an Italian sea captain that he had proved by experience that a ship goes faster when her sails are perforated with a number of holes than when they are quite sound was at first looked upon as too ridiculous for consideration.

Unbelievers, however, now find that the Italian has gone a long way towards proving his case. His theory is that the force f the wind cannot fairly take effect on an inflated sail, because of the cushion of immovable air that fills up the hollow. To prevent the cushion collecting, he bored a number of holes in the sail, which let part of the wind blow right through it and allowed the remainder to strike against the canvas and exercise its full effect.

Several trials have been made, and it looks as if that is another of these paradoxical truths which appear so impossible on the surface. The experiments were made in all weathers. In a light wind a boat with ordinary sails made four knots, while with the perforated sails she covered five and a quarter knots; in a fresh breeze she did seven knots with ordinary sails, and eight and three-quarter knots with the improved sails; in a strong wind she did eight knots and ten knots respectively. If this augmented speed were sustained throughout a long voyage it would increase the value of a spin onefifth, as she would make the same trip in four weeks that she did before in five weeks.

The Fighting Mast.

In that coming naval battle between the steel fleets of two first-class powers, to which nautical authorities have been looking forward ever since modern battleships became the mighty engines of problematical forces that they are, the military mast and fighting top will play a deadly part, and be the station of danger and heroism.

As everybody knows, the old mast, the mast of yards and sails, has vanished from the modern ship of war. The Newark is the only modern ship in the United States navy which has sail carrying masts. The place of the mast that was erected for sail-carrying purposes is taken on the modern warship by a steel tower, which rises from the deck to support one, or maybe three or four circular galleries, where rapid fire or machine guns are placed, which in time of action, pour their hail of bullets at the decks and ports of

the hostile ship. The object is to kill the gunners, for it is self-evident that the most powerful gun is powerless if its crew is dead. Take the twenty rapid-fire guns distributed along the superstructure of the Indiana. From a fighting top such a storm of lead could be driven upon these great guns as would make it impossible for men to work them. Therefore, it will be one of the first duties of a warship to shoot away with to heavy guns the military mast of its

As one well-directed shot will send the mast tumbling, it is not probable that any ship will come out of an engagement with its military mast standing. The shooting away of the mast will, of course, mean the death of every man in the fighting tops. Men sent there will know as they climb the dark ladder to their stations, that they go to almost certain death, and will have only one duty before them, to kill as many of the enemy as they can before the crash comes.

Men who in turrets and sponsons below are handling the great guns have every hope of life and victory before them, but the men in the tops go to their duty with no such hopes and expectations. To man the fighting tops in action will be a kind of martyr-

dom especially hard to endere. To perform deeds of valor in the face of contending armies, or to suffer with fortitude in the gaze of admiring thousands is one thing; to climb up calmly inside a steel post and work away at such an unpoetical mechanical device as a rapid-fire or machine gun until fully furnished. such time as it may please the enemy to blow one into "Kingdom come" is quite another thing.


