A Bark's Narrow Escape.

Considerable anxiety was felt here yesterday afternoon relative to the bark Wm. Gordon. She arrived off Partridge Island, Wednesday, from Newport, Eng., and Capt. Bell came up to port for orders. He was instructed to proceed to Hopewell Cape, but the weather being unfavorable he was unable to get away. When yesterday's gale sprang up both anchors were let go, and it was hoped the vessel would easily ride out the storm. The gale was so severe that during the afternoon one of the cables parted and the vessel began to drift ashore. In the absence of Captain Bell, who was in the city, the mate displayed the letters H. V. C., which was promptly signalled from the Island and put up on the Custom, house signal station. These letters mean "send immediate assistance," and the people on the Island also put up the letters P. N., "tug wanted." This was also repeated at the Custom house. Capt. Bell, accompanied by Pilot John Sproul and others started out on the tug Dirigo, hoping to be able to reach the vessel. In this they were mistaken, the sea being too much for the boat. Later on the Neptune lar.ded Capt. Bell and Pilot Sproul on Partridge Island, and they by the use of the signal flags learned of the plight in which the vessel was. Capt. Bell signalled to the mate to slip the other anchor and come up to port. This was done and the vessel ran up the west channel about 6.30

The men on board had an exciting time of it. But for the steps taken the Gordon would undoubtedly have been driven ashore.—Sun, Friday.
