Buctouche DEC. 24.—Smelt fishing has been highly remunerative to the fishermen of this beautiful river so far this winter.

Mr. Wilbur is a heavy sufferer by the fire which burnt his tannery lately, as I hear it was not insured.

There is considerable activity in the lumber woods in this section. Mr. Thos. Burns has removed his rotary mill from Kingston to Black River, where he has bought log privileges from Louis Bastarache and others. Mr. Peter J. King is now removing his rotary saw mill from here to the Bayley grant, a large 1800 acre block of land owned by J. W. Y. Smith, of Moncton, lying a few miles east of Canaan station, to saw the logs on said block for B. S. Smith, who has purchased the privileges along with our genial townsmen, Adam Coates, who is now on said block building camps, &c. They propose hiring a large number of men and teams, and will rush things with a view to doing a big winter's work.

Wm. Johnson has returned from Kings county to pass the Christmas season with his friends here.

M. McLaughlan has added a third set of stones to his mill and has now one of the best equipped steam grist mills in the country. Alfred Sheraton has also added steam to his grist mill at Little River, which will be a great convenience to the farmers of Kent. It is encouraging to note that the Kent farmers have raised a very good wheat and an immense buckwheat crop this year, and they will consequently buy very little imported Ontario flour next year. It is almost criminal in them to have to buy any at all.

On 12th inst., Oliver (Marin) Girouard died suddenly at his home, McLean Settlement, Kent Co. He was 70 years old.
