



I ONDON, Sept. 19 -Gen. Sir Herber Kitchener, in command of the Anglo-Egyptian expedition to Dongola, telegraphed to-day from K rma, on the Nile to the war office announcing that he occupied Kerma without opposition at dawn. the enemy having retired to the west bank at El Hafr. The disputch adds that the Sindar shelled the enemy's position on the east, and that ander the cover of this fire three gunboats passed up the river on the way to Dongola Sinking the enemy's steamer and i flicting beavy loss up in the Dervishes. A tersely written article on the progress of scientific agriculture in the August Farming, might be placed in noticeable contrast with the contention of the agricultural press of a few years since. To illustrate by a concrete case the history of progress in dairying is taken to show how general the spread of information concerning it has become. New methods of farming are in evidence every day and in every country and the wide awake farmer, like his friends in other branches of trade must keep in touch with the progress of the age, or he can soon become a back num. ber. The regular departments of Farming are fully up to the average as sources of valuable information.

Annie Kempton's Monument,




