BURNED TO DEATH.—A very sad accident took place at the residence of Mr. Charles Sanderson, Greenwich, Lot 40, P. E. Island, on Tuesday, 8th inst. Mr. Sanderson was engaged at some distance from the house. Mrs. Sanderson in the discharge of some household duty was out for less than five minutes. On her return she was horrified to meet her eldest little daughter, Fessie Matilda, aged 2 years and five months, in flames. She extinguished them but it was all too late. The little sufferer lingered until 10 p. m. the 9th inst., when death released her from her sufferings.

MIRAMICHI PRESBYTERY.—Rev. Neil McKay, in his report of the proceedings of the Presbytery of Miramichi, says: Since the union of 1875 the Assembly in its annual meetings has itinerated between such centers as Toronto, Montreal, Hamilton, St. John, Halifax, etc. It is now proposed to locate the annual meetings in some one central city. The Presbytery disapproved this proposal as premature, and as the present method is working satisfactorily, it is unnecessary to disturb it. A proposal to form a central missionary board to control the finances of the Home and Foreign Missionary committee was also disapproved. The Presbytery approved a proposal to establish a board of Sabbath school publications, and recommended Rev. T. F. Fotheringham as editor in connection therewith. The Presbytery also approved of increased stringency in receiving ministers from other denominations.

The Cuban Resolution

NEW YORK, Dec. 22.—A special to the World from Washington says: The strong resolution in favor of Cuba reported today to the senate will never pass the house. This prediction is made positively in the face of unquestioned fact that a great many in the house favor the Cuban cause.

But the Cameron resolution will be fought over in committee undoubtedly amended and it will never come to a vote in the full house.

Speaker Reed's vast influence is against it. One year ago this week the house passed with all considered haste the Venezuela commission bill which put the country in the war fever in a few hours.

Speaker Reed has been severely criticized for his lack of conservatism at that time. He is conservative enough today to suit the most peace loving citizen in the country. He is against intert. rance. He is quoted as saying to a friend: 'I have failed to discover any great enthusiasm for the senate committee's resolution over on our side of the capitol. I do not think that we want to go headhanded into a foreign war unless there is mighty good cause for it.'

The sentiments are Speaker Reed's if the words are not. He will have killed or amended the Cameron resolution if it ever reaches the house.

Temperance Rally at Richibu to Hall.

Wednesday last the public meeting under Division auspices was crowded to the porch doors. Th- closest attention was given by all present to every part of the admirable programme. The music, recitations and readings were warmly received by the audience. Revs. W. R. Robinson, W. Lawson and H. A. Meek moved resolutions bearing on several aspects of the License system, which being put to the meeting, were carried with practical unanimity by a rising vote—one on standing to vote nay.

It must be said, however, that one gentleman, after the vote had been taken, rose to say he did not vote for one of the resolutions. The mover and seconder of said resolution, Revs. Robinson and Lawson, agreed to a reconsideration of said resolution. This they did, not that the audience wished it, or that they retracted or flinched from the purpose or spirit of the resolution, but to make a challenge to the dissenting to meet on the platform, to fairly, frankly and fully discuss it on its own merits. This, Mr. Robinson said they were ready to do on short notice and to show the Temperance folk did not wish to take a "snap vote." Surely there will be a response in all honesty or else wise silence.

As it is certain the citizens of Richibucto are in dead earnest, more than they ever were, it was further suggested that a meeting of the citizens at large should be held for the discussion of the burning question of License or no License. As was pointed out, the conditions of the holding of a License at all, are grossly ignored by the Licenses on both sides of the River.

The people who daily observe these violations keep asking Division and churches, what can be done? Another meeting in the near future will answer this question. Meantime work is being done by a strong committee of the Division. Mr. Allan Haines made a most able chairman, and closed the meeting by singing God Save the Queen. From such meetings a great deal is expected by every true citizen of the town.

Eight Persons Burned to Death.

NEWPORT, R. I., Dec. 21.—About 10.30 Sunday night Ediza Ann, Martha and Charlotte Wilbour, aged respectively 90, 83 and 86, were burned to death in their home on Spring street. The older sister was an invalid and the younger one was apparently bathing with alcohol, which in some way ignited and set her clothing on fire. She rushed into another room, where the third sister was abed, and set the bed afire. Passers by saw the smoke, and gave an alarm. The doors were burst open and the fire extinguished. The sisters were daughters of Norton Wilbour, years ago one of Newport's most prominent traders. They were all that were left of the family.

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—A family of five persons were burned to death in their home, 514 East 58th street, Sunday night by fire caused by the explosion of a lamp. The dead are: Aaron Goldsmith, 45 years old; Mrs. Matilda Goldsmith, 33; Bertha Goldsmith, 10; Hattie Goldsmith, 8; Frank Goldsmith, 6. A servant escaped by jumping out of the second floor window to the rear yard. The damage done to the property was slight. The bodies of the victims were burned to a crisp and beyond recognition. In the front parlor on the first floor was an immense piano lamp. This lamp undoubtedly exploded, throwing the oil all about and spreading the fire in every direction.

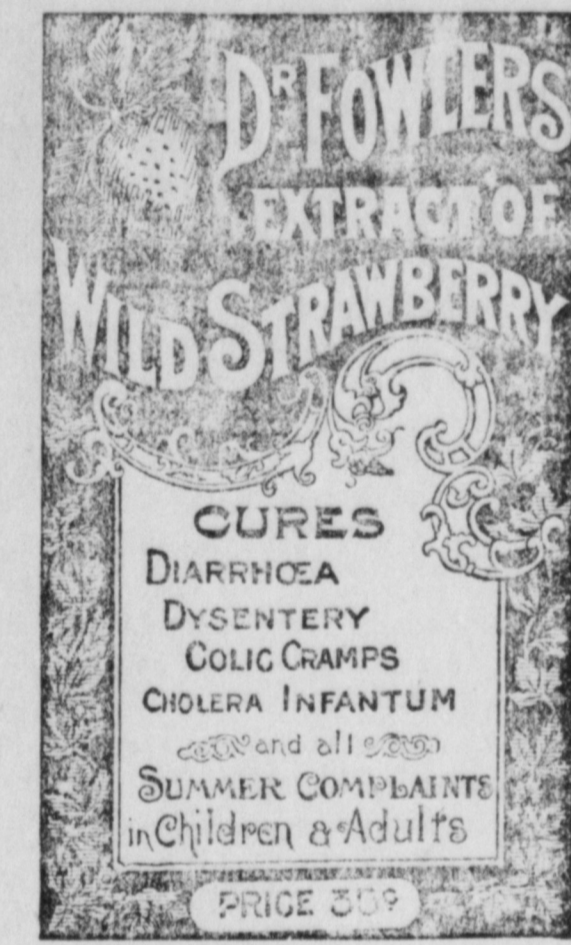
