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THROWING RICE.

A Practice That One Railroad is Trying to Stop.

"Showering newly-married couples is a very old-time custom and will probably continue for all time to come—and it is a harmless custom. It is fun for the friends of the bride and groom doing the showering, and not harmful to the showered, but in some places it is a decided annoyance to others," said a traveling man. "On railroad trains for instance, where friends follow the couple into the car and in their haste to do their work before the train starts not only shower the newly-married, but everybody who chances to sit within two or three seats of them (and I am one of the victims), to say nothing of covering the floor and cushions with rice. At some stations the friends are not allowed to pass out of the depot waiting-room and the rice is thrown as the couple leave, and others going out at the same time receive a liberal share. The floor is also covered with rice. The New York Central railroad sometime ago issued an order prohibiting the throwing of rice in or about the cars or about the depots, but little attention has been paid to it, and the throwing is done so suddenly that the depot attaches are unable to prevent it. Yet it does not occur as often now as formerly, and the railroad people are in hopes that it will cease entirely in the near future."

A CHEESE 236 YEARS OLD.

It Carries the Family History of a Swiss Squire.

One of the most peculiar bridal or marriage customs known is one that has prevailed for centuries in what is called the "cheese regions" of Switzerland.

In that portion of the Alpine country, when a pair join in wedlock, it is the fashion for their intimate friends to buy a "register cheese" for the young couple. This cheese is presented to the newly wedded people on the evening of the wedding day, and is ever after retained by them and used as a family register.

On this heirloom cheese the whole history of the family is carved, such as births, marriages, deaths and other incidents which it may be desired to make matters of record. Some of these old Swiss family cheese records are said to date back to the middle of the seventeenth century.

At the agricultural fair annually held at Gessenay a great many cheese records have been exhibited, which were known to be from 180 to 200 years old. The oldest that has yet been displayed belongs to a country squire living near Gessenay, who shows his family record carved on a cheese made in 1660.

Bicycles of the Past.

Archaeologists will be interested to know that the first record of a bicycle is that of a stained glass window in the church of Stoke Pogis, near Windsor, in England. It was this churchyard, by the way, which inspired Gray to write his ever famous "Elegy." The rider of the cycle in the picture on the window, which is dated 1642, would be mistaken for Pan with his pipe were it elsewhere than in a Christian church, where pagan deities are not made at home. But history is silent as to the use of any such vehicle at that time. One hundred and twenty years or so later there was exhibited before the French court a manumotive carriage of several hundred pounds weight, but the bicycle can scarcely have grown from that. It was much nearer our own time that the first genuine bicycle was invented. It was quite the fashion to ride such a vehicle in England in 1819. The new invention was variously called the "dandy horse," the "hobby horse" and the "velocipede."

There are many allusions to it in the records of the day, and in a letter from John Keats in February, 1819, to his brother in America, I find this mention of it:—"The nothing of the day is a machine called the velocipede. It is a wheel carriage to ride cock horse upon, sitting astride and pushing it along with the toes, a rudder wheel in hand. A handsome gelding will come to 8 guineas. However, they will soon be cheaper, unless the army takes to them."—Lippincott's.

Insects That Eat Cables.

Prof. Bouvier, at the Paris Academy of Sciences, has been describing the destruction of a telegraphic cable by insects. The cable (a land one) was laid in Tonkin in 1894, and was composed of seven copper wires protected by an insulating envelope coated with cotton and jute. In addition to this, it was placed in a leaden pipe. Notwithstanding all these precautions, the cable, which was laid on a marshy soil, began to show signs of decay in 1895, and it was found necessary to replace it in the spring of the present year. On examining the cavities in the protecting envelope M. Bouvier discovered that they had been made by termites. Milne Edwards, commenting on the professor's address, said that it was not the first time that injury to metals by insects had been noted. During the Crimean war bullets were found to have been perforated by hymenoptera, which came from the deal boards of which the packing cases had been made.

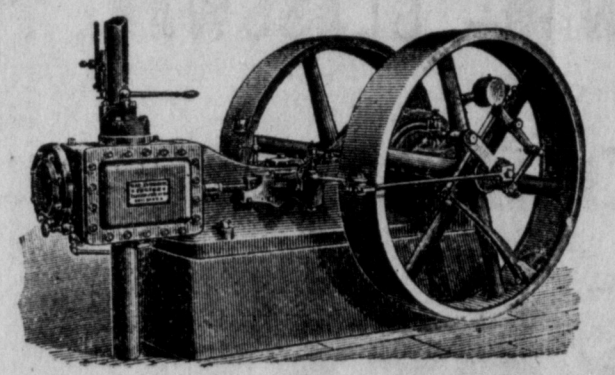
