SERIOUS CHARGES AGAINST A YOUNG N.--Post Office Inspector King, under the directions of Warren C. Winslow, Esq. agent of the Department of Justice, laid information yesterday, at Newcastle, against a young man, E. P. Smith, late assistant in the Newcastle post office, charging him with serious offences against the Post Office Act, in respect of registered matter handled at that office. These charges embrace: delay in the transmission of registered letters, altering the date stamps on registered letters, opening registered letters, stealing registered letters and the money contents-in all, some twenty-five cases. These depredations appear to have been confined to a recent short period, between the 25th of May, and 8th of June last, when Smith was discharged by the post-master. The young man, who is most respectably connected. and who has always held a good reputation, denied that he is guilty of the charges, and was admitted to bail, with two sureties of \$500 each. The case will be heard before Justice Nevins on Wednesday next at Newcastle.-Globe.


