JOHN GRAHAM, KOUCHIBOUQUAC. Among the oldest and best known residents of Kent County is the subject of this sketch—Mr. John Graham, of Kouchibouguac. It is said everyone has a double, Mr. Graham's features bear a very striking resemblance to Hon. W. E. Gladstone. He was born in Belfast, Ireland, in 1815 and emigrated to Canada with his parents in 1822, settling in Miramichi. He removed to Kouchibouguac in 1832, marrying Miss Mary Bell, of that place, two years subsequently, by whom he had nineteen children, viz: Catherine, born 1834, married Robert Kennedy, and is living in Kouchibouguac; Elizabeth, born 1836, died in infancy; Daniel, born 1838, married Miss Mary Saunders and died in Nova Scotia in 1887; William, born 1839, married Catherine Chadwick, resides in Kouchibouguac; John, born 1840, married Miss Adeline Jones, of Richibucto, and is now residing in the United States;

Solomon, who was born in 1842, met with a painful death when only twenty months old by scalding; Robert, born 1844, married Miss Marion Ward, of Richibucto River, and now resides in the place of his birth; Margaret, born 1846, died 1889; Mary, born 1847, married James Fitzpatrick, of Richibucto, where she now resides. James, born 1848, married Miss Annie Saunders, of St. Stephen, where she now resides; Christopher, born 1849, died when eighteen months old; Jane, born 1850, married Wm. Long, of Richibucto, where she is now residing; Annie and Agnes (twins) born 1853; Annie, who married Paul Legoof, of Richibucto, died in 1893; Agnes, married James McCafferty, of Belfast, Ireland, and now resides in Kouchibouguac. Christopher, born 1854, married Miss Maggie Morrell, of Kouchibouguac, where he is now living; Ellen, born 1855, married Henry Whalen, the well-known and popular lumberman of Kouchibouguac; George, born 1857; Thomas, born 1859, was married twice the first wife being Miss Catherine Bell, of Kouchibouguac, after whose death he married Miss Martha Clark, of the same place; Lucy, born 1862, married Robert Alanaeh, and is residing in Kouchibouguac. After the death of Mrs. Graham, he married Miss Annie Legoof, of Richibucto, in 1884, by whom he had one child, Hannah, born in 1885. Mr. Graham had the distinction of taking the first timber raft that was sent around the coast from Kouchibouguac to Miramichi. He is now enjoying good health and bids fair to live many more years, being in full possession of his faculties.

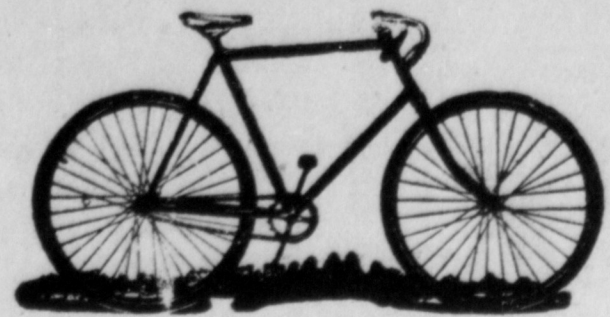
