

A Drunken Father Attempts to Behead His Son

BERLIN, Sept. 24.—One of the most extraordinary results of drunken frenzy ever known has just occurred in East Prussia. A farmer named Schlott, of Gemute, while looking over his domain one morning last week, saw a lot of cattle coming through a broken gate into his cornfield. He hunted up his young son, who was in charge of that particular field and upbraided him for not better attending to his duties. The boy's answers enraged the man, and he swore that he would have his son's life. He called together half a dozen of his companions, who, like himself, had been drinking, and formed a frenzied sort of court-martial. The culprit was summarily tried and convicted, and Schlott himself sentenced his son to be beheaded. Preparations for the prompt execution of the lad were at once begun. They bound him hand and foot and placed his head upon the stump of a tree. One of the wretches secured an axe and the sentence of the court was actually about to be carried out, when the terrified boy's mother and elder brothers, attracted by his screams, rushed to his rescue. They wrested the axe from the executioner's hands, and then ensued a fierce struggle between the rescuing party and the drunken creature, who wished to put the boy to death. It resulted in a victory for the mother and her sons. The boy, during the encounter, had grown suddenly silent, and it was found later that fear had not only made him dumb but deaf as well, and physicians say it is doubtful if he will ever recover the use of his faculties again.

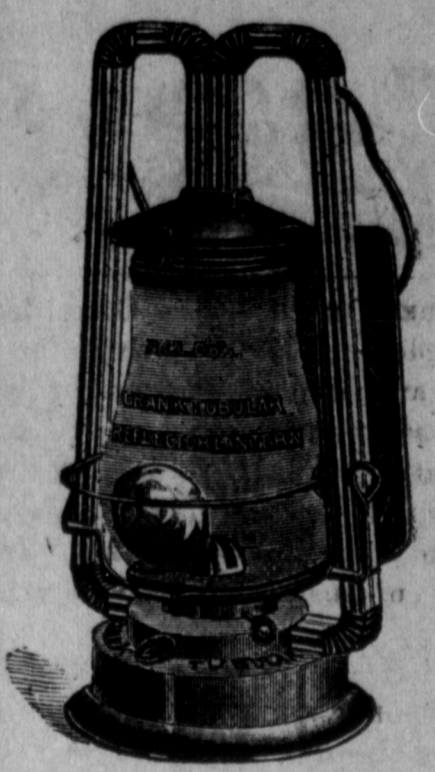
