What exactly happened no one knows, but when the neighbors appeared on the scene they found the insane wife sitting on the husband's dead body singing, while with the hands with which she had evidently strangled him she still clutched his throat. Measures have been taken to prevent the unfortunate woman from doing further harm.

Antidote For Potato Bugs.

MUNICE, Ind, Sept 26 —Patrick Billow came near meeting death in a peculiar manner yesterday. He is employed at the Indiana Iron Works. While walking down the Lake Erie and Western tracks this evening a bug flew into his mouth and he swallowed it.
From the taste the insect left in his throat he thought it was a potato bug, and hastened to his boarding house and asked the landlady what she used to kill potato bugs. She stated that she generally used paris green, and he then went to a drug store, where he purchased and swallowed a large quantity of the drug.
In a short time he was suffering with pains in his stomach and became unconscious. Physicians were called administered emetics, and the man was relieved of a potato bug. He is out of danger.

This morning as one of his relations was taking something from his pocket a small slip off the corner of a newspaper fell unnoticed by him to the ground. It was picked up and on being opened was found, "Send for John Warren. I met him and George in St. John Saturday night and got money from them." The above was clear and distinct and was evidently written with blood. The note is now in the hand of a city officer.

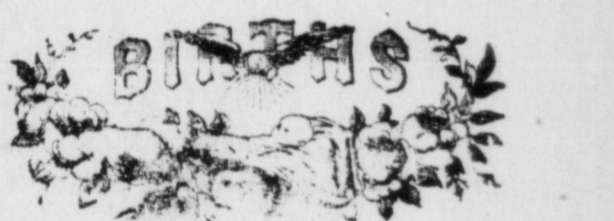

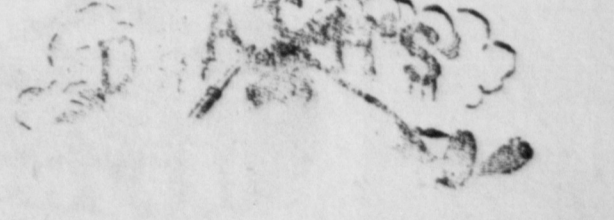
