CARE OF THE MOUTH.

Fine Teeth and How to Preserve Them. Valuable Washes.

Dentistry has reached such perfection that though the shape of the individual tooth cannot be controlled, the general contour of the jaw may be regulated. The semi-circle of teeth can be flattened or arched as beauty requires.

The popular advice as to the care of the teeth is too indefinite. A general washing night and morning does not suffice to keep teeth brilliant and free from discoloration. A soft emulsi brush should be used after each meal about the necks of the teeth. There the enamel is thinnest and least intact, so that bits of food are likely to be retained. A decidedly stiff brush should be used to cleanse the inner side of the teeth where tarter deposits itself, and on the double teeth with their many irregularities of conformation. But it is senseless to rub the smooth outer enamel of the front teeth with bristles, when a bit of chamiso or soft linen with a little dry precipitated chalk will polish them effectually. The "bits" should be used each time.

Silk floss should be passed frequently between all the teeth but with little pressure. Even in the privacy of one's own room it is not desirable to use a toothpick. A wooden toothpick is clumsy, liable to inflame the gums. With the more delicate quill pick there is danger of severing minute fibres of the gums. The toothpick process results in time in a loosened molar. If a shred of food gets obstinately wedged beneath the gum it is better not to worry at it oneself, but to go to a dentist and have him with his practiced manipulation and needle-like instruments remove the particle.

The greatest precaution should be taken not to loosen a tooth. A full mouth of teeth is a great beauty; spaces are not only unbecomingly but fruitful of trouble, the food continually pressing in keeps the gums inflamed, and on the health of the gums and mucous membrane of the mouth depends to a big extent the health of the teeth.

An aching tooth should never be borne with. I have known a woman to endure, without consulting a dentist, the repeated excruciating toothache that attends a dying nerve. The pain finally subsided, for good and all; but the tooth gradually became discolored, taking on a drabish tone. Then, for the first time this unlucky woman suspected what had happened. The pulp, the dead nerve, was removed, but the tooth never regained its clear pearly lustre.

If one is troubled with dyspepsia or any gastric disturbance, the teeth bear witness to the fact. They lose their brilliancy, often become stained a dark saffron about their necks. Every pretty dyspeptic should make a point of keeping by her bedside a wine glass of water into which is stirred a teaspoonful of bicarbonate of soda to rinse her mouth as often as she wakes. The bicarbonate counteracts the effect of any acidity of the stomach on the teeth.

Pure castile soap may be used occasionally with benefit, the daily use of soap on the teeth is discouraged by the best dentists. Suds leave a deposit of soap beneath the gums that encourage their recession.

A few drops of listerine, or myrrh, or weak carbolic acid and water, make an excellent mouth-wash, antiseptic, healing and hardening to the gums. The myrrh leaves an aroma as of violets in the mouth. A handsome and fastidious woman of my acquaintance takes internally several times a week, a little pellet of rhubarb dissolved in bicarbonate of soda and water to sweeten her breath.

The beauty of the mouth is not made complete by the rosiness and smoothness of the lips and the perfection of the teeth between; also its size is a minor consideration. What we demand of it is that it shall please us; if it pleased us we are apt to call it a pretty mouth. It must have either positive beauty of outline, or an expression of geniality. Everybody dislikes equally a "pruned-and-crisis" mouth, or the lazily obtruding mouth which is the possession generally of stupid, heavy people who let their mouth put out in pure inanity. Exact, nice, but easy enunciation moulds the mouth into dignity and beauty.

The Jumbo of Pikes. A pike of monstrous size has been taken in Coleraine. An inland revenue official has written to vouch for its weight of 61 pounds, the length being given as 78 inches, and the girth as 31 inches. This amazing beast seems to have been basking in the Ogilvy river, and was too proud to get out of the way of a boat. Coffee as a Deodorizer. One of the best of deodorizers is burning coffee. It will remove any musty odors from closets or closed rooms.

BOTTOM OF THE ATLANTIC.

Queer Contrasts if the Ocean Suddenly Became Dry.

If the Atlantic were to be converted into dry land it would form a huge valley, with the mountain masses of the Eastern and Western continents rising on either side. Itself 9,000 miles wide, it would be divided by two ridges, parallel to each other and to the marginal rims, into three minor valleys, each from 500 to 600 miles in breadth. The dividing ridges would reach about half the elevation of the continental margins, and would form broad, undulating plateaux. Here and there they would rise into lofty summits, mostly volcanic, which now are known as islands, such as Iceland and the Azores. These mountain platforms would be covered by a fine grey mud, like chalk, while the three valleys would be occupied by red clay. The physical features of the new country would present a striking contrast to the scenery of our existing continents. The outlines would be soft and flowing. Precipices, gorges and sharp ridges would be almost unknown. The broad troughs would rise gradually and smoothly into the elevated plateaux. This difference is due to the absence of atmospheric action. The bed of the Atlantic has not been exposed for countless ages, if ever, to the wear and tear of frost, rain and running water, and consequently the physical features of the new land would be such as would be mainly determined by the gradual upheaval of parts of the great Atlantic trough, or by the planing action of the waves during submergence. In the course of time, river systems would be formed, and the sculpturing of the new surface would become more varied and picturesque.

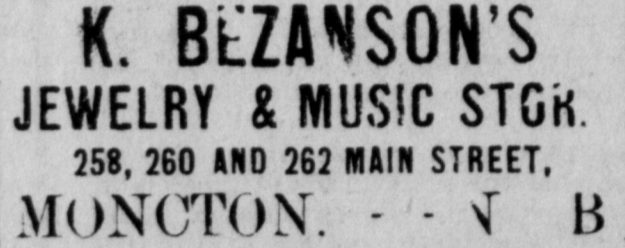
