OTTAWA, Oct. 2.—The House went at once into committee of supply after the Speaker had taken the chair.

On the item in connection with expenses of the House of Commons, Mr. Foster wanted to know why the services of Mr. Patchell, of St. John, who had been employed as a messenger, had been dispensed with.

The Speaker said it had been reported to him that Patchell was too much above his business, and was uncontrollable as a messenger.

Mr. Foster objected to the vote for the salary of the deputy speaker of the Senate. The item was accordingly dropped.

Mr. Fisher explained the item of \$20,000 towards providing for cold storage and the carriage of Canadian perishable food products and to secure recognition of the quality of such products in the markets of Great Britain in an undeteriorated condition. To attain good results it would be necessary to provide a continuous chain of cold storage from the point of production to the market. This would necessitate probably the establishment of warehouses in the interior, cold storage arrangements on the railways, cold storage warehouses at the points of shipment and cold storage upon the vessels that would cross the ocean. He proposed to make arrangements by which vessels would leave Montreal, Halifax and St. John in summer and Halifax and St. John in winter and carry Canadian products in storage to Avonmouth, Liverpool, London and Glasgow. During the ensuing season he expected to extend the refrigerator car service over every part of the country where the demand justified it to enable perishable products to be taken to the point of shipment. His scheme involved the giving of a small bonus to every creamery that would provide cold storage accommodation for perishable products awaiting shipment. The expense of providing such accommodation to creamery owners would vary from \$200 to \$400. Any creamery which had earned the bonus would receive \$50 this season, \$35 next season and \$25 the succeeding season, \$100. He thought it would be necessary to secure this season warehouses at the point of shipment. He thought it would be necessary to make contracts for as long as five years with steamship companies and warehousemen to obtain the best results. Something in the shape of propaganda would be required to advertise the scheme in the British market, and to overcome the prejudice against Canadian food products which has been created by their reception in bad condition. If the expectations of the farmers and dealers were justifiable this trade should be in such a position in three years that it would be self-supporting or nearly so.

Northumberland

While in most places one visits the Summer is the season on whose success or failure the people attach the greatest importance, the people of this famous and highly lauded county look to the Winter as being the season, which propitious or otherwise will most assuredly determine their financial prospects for the coming year. While both the fishing and farming industries are very important, it is still quite true that lumber here, like cotton in the South, is king. A noble king he is in sooth and a noble army he keeps employed, South men as he gives employment during the keen frosty days of Winter and the hot dusty days of Summer, might well gladden the heart of even a Frederick should they have appeared on parade at Potadam. Tail and broad shouldered with hands, chin and neck indicating the highest condition, they have the lithe and active step of mountaineers combined with the precision and deliberation of the dweller on the plains.

Several thousand of these young men are even now busy in the forest. As your readers all know Hon. J. B. Snowball is the heaviest employer of labor in this county, and does a very large and successful business. However, the great lumber king of the Nashwaak is now doing a fine and increasing trade in the staple and is steadily pushing his way to the front. Mr. Richards and Ritchie Bros. come close behind and now that Mr. Vaughn is opening fire from his fortress at Black Brook, we may expect to see somewhat keener competition, than ever yet.

The management of the extensive pulp mills show much energy and are evidently making a success. Some of the gentlemen interested say that the duty on pulp going to the States is by no means prohibitive. And that even an increase of duty would not effect their position as it will only advance the price there to an equal degree. Why can't our people look far enough ahead to see the advantages of getting a good company to work this industry in Kent? That county has many advantages over even Miramichi. The fleet of ships now lying in the harbor, shows that the busy mills of Miramichi have not been able to supply the demand for the fine lumber of this section as some of them are experiencing difficulty in getting their cargoes.

In Chatham the traces of the great fire of last year are still painfully visible. A great gap was made in the lively town which is now being slowly filled up as fills a wound in the bosom of a stricken warrior.

In Blackville we have a growing town of great promise. Alex Gibson has added a steam mill to the water mill which he purchased from Farley Bros., and is doing much towards adding to the importance of the place. His manager, Mr. DesBrisay, is a Richibucto boy, and is, with his excellent wife and family a powerful factor in Blackville social life. He is like his father used to be in Kent, a favorite with the young men of the place. Mr. McIntosh, who has charge of the fine school that is the boast of Blackville, is also well known in Kent, where he taught for some years. Rev. Thomas Johnston, the respected Presbyterian minister, has so many relatives in Kent that he seems almost as one of our own people. Mr. Johnston is one of the men who always grow. His sermons have now even more power than they had years ago when his presence at Bass River or Kingston would ensure a well filled house at anytime. The visit of Mr. McKay, the well known evangelist, whose work in Kent has borne so good and abiding fruit, has been of great advantage to this congregation. He was here for some weeks this past summer and seems to have taken the good people of Blackville by storm, as well as to have severely bombarded some of the fortresses of Satan. Mr. Johnston has been stationed here now nearly forty years, and is probably the oldest minister, as to settlement in N. B.

Politics are decidedly quiet. The desperate efforts of some of the Grit politicians to get control of the county has been cleverly headed off by Mr. Robinson. The reports circulated by some of the Liberal papers of him leaving his own is not taken seriously here. Personal friend is beyond doubt to Mr. Blair, and disposed to give the Govt. of which he is a member, a fair chance to develop its policy, but that he is a Conservative through and through is not doubted here.
