THE BUCTOUCHE BUTTER FACTORY.—One day last week a REVIEW representative visited the butter factory of Buctouche and was by the kindness of Mr. Michael McLaughlin, the manager, shown through the establishment. The factory was established in 1893 and has since proved a boon to the farmers of Buctouche and vicinity. The milk from 450 cows is taken, making a daily average of about 4500 lbs. of milk which makes about 200 lbs. of butter, which sells from 18 to 21c per lb. The butter is sold in St. John and Halifax. There is a first class grist mill with a capacity of about 200 bus. per day. And besides the regular sets of stones there is a grain crusher which is considered a great convenience. There are also two carding mills capable of carding 300 lbs. per diem. Both the grist and carding mills work full time and for a few months after the new grain comes in, the grist mill will grind day and night. To the carding mill wool comes from Kent, Westmorland and Northumberland counties. Several horse loads of about a half a ton each came from Bay du Vin the present summer.

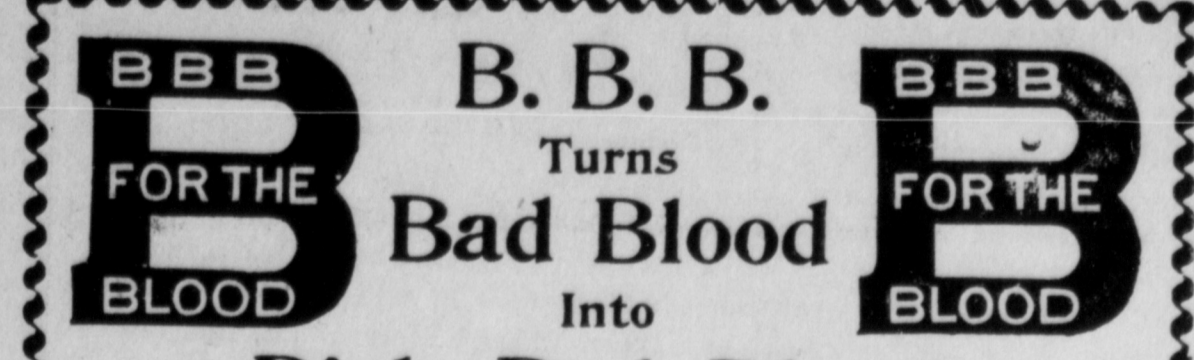

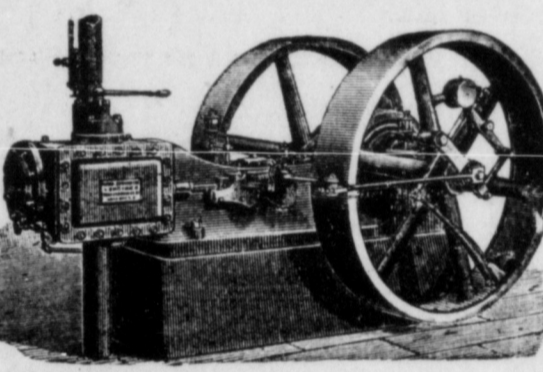
