

The First Session of The New Parlia-

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.-At 3 o'clock this afternoon His Excellency the Governor General proceeded to the chamber of the Senate in the Parliament building and took his seat upon the throne. The members of the Senate being assembled, His Excellency was pleased to command the attention of the House of Commons, and that House being present His Excellency was pleased to open the first session of the eighth Parliament of Canada with the following speech:

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

The necessity of making provision for the public service has compelled me to summon you together at this somewhat inconvenient season.

It is impossible to lay before you at this session the public accounts for the past year, or indeed any of the reports usually submitted to Parliament. Under these circumstances and in view of the fact that you will be required to re-assemble early in the ensuing year, it does not appear expedient to invite your attention to any measures beyond the passage of the sup

The operation of the tariff will be made the subject of careful enquiry during the recess with a view to the preparation of such a measure as may, without doing injustice to any interest, materially lighten the burdens of the people.
