The World's Rivers.

The Tigris is 1,150 miles long. The Tiber is only 230 miles long. The world-famous Orontes is only 240 miles long. The Zambeze, in South Africa, is 1,800 miles in length. Slow rivers flow at the rate of three to seven miles an hour. Twelve creeks in the United States bear the name of the Rhine. Every ancient city of note was located on or near the sea or a river. The Hudson River, from its mouth to the Lakes, is 400 miles in length. For over 1,200 miles the Nile does not receive a single tributary stream. The Ganges is 1,570 miles long and drains an area of 750,000 square miles. The Mississippi and its tributaries drain an area of 2,000,000 square miles. The branches of the Mississippi have an aggregate length of 15,000 miles. The Connecticut, the principal stream of New England, is 450 miles in length. In islands of too small a size to have rivers creeks are dignified by that name. The Irtysh, in Siberia, is 2,200 miles in length, and drains 600,000 miles of territory. The most extensive protective river works in Europe are at the mouth of the Danube.

Lord Dufferin has gone out of active political life. Advancing years and broken health are given as the causes. His has been a most brilliant career. Few men if any living have filled so many important positions, and undertaken so many missions fraught with the gravest results. He has made war and made peace. He has time and again preserved peace, when peace seemed impossible. His history is practically the history of the world, so great have been the affairs with which he is connected. Canada owes him a debt of gratitude. Undoubtedly he was the greatest governor general we have ever had.

Governor-General of Canada. Ambassador at St. Petersburg. Ambassador at Constantinople. Viceroy of India. Ambassador at Rome. Ambassador at Paris. Lord Dufferin is a K. P., G. C. B., G. C. S. L., G. C. I. E., G. C. M. G., P. C., D. C. L., L. L. D. and F. R. S. His Lordship has also been Chancellor of the Royal University, and Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports and Constable of Dover.

The First Session of The New Parliament.

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—At 3 o'clock this afternoon His Excellency the Governor General proceeded to the chamber of the Senate in the Parliament building and took his seat upon the throne. The members of the Senate being assembled, His Excellency was pleased to command the attention of the House of Commons, and that House being present His Excellency was pleased to open the first session of the eighth Parliament of Canada with the following speech:

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

The necessity of making provision for the public service has compelled me to summon you together at this somewhat inconvenient season.

It is impossible to lay before you at this session the public accounts for the past year, or indeed any of the reports usually submitted to Parliament. Under these circumstances and in view of the fact that you will be required to re-assemble early in the ensuing year, it does not appear expedient to invite your attention to any measures beyond the passage of the supplies.

The operation of the tariff will be made the subject of careful enquiry during the recess with a view to the preparation of such a measure as may, without doing injustice to any interest, materially lighten the burdens of the people.

Immediate steps will be taken to effect a settlement of the Manitoba school question, and I have every confidence that when Parliament next assembles this important controversy will have been satisfactorily adjusted.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

The estimates for the current year will be laid before you forthwith.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I hope that when you will have given the necessary attention to the consideration of the year's supplies I may be able to relieve you from the duty of further attendance at this session of Parliament.

On the opening of the House yesterday afternoon Hon. J. D. Edgar was chosen Speaker without opposition.

Col. Domville gives notice that he will move for a commission to inquire into the militia of Canada, its organization, arming, equipment, clothing and all other matters connected with the defence of Canada. Col. Domville also gives notice that he will move for copies of all instructions given on the Intercolonial Railway by the authorities to remove the employees shortly before June 23, the day of election to prevent their voting in the counties in which they reside the names of the authorities giving such instructions and their authority therefor.
